The Late Mr. W. J. Herder.

(Hr. Grace Standard)

The news was had here on Monday forenoon that Mr. William J. Herder, the well-known proprietor of the Evening Telegram, had passed away at noon the day previous. Mr. Herder had not been in good health for some time previous to his death, and had taken some few months ago, a trip to Bermuda. While on the trip, he contracted pneumonia, that seemed to be serious, but he was privileged to re- turn home. Although heart trouble laid its hold upon him and he suffered more or less from that affliction, he was equal to his work, and daily attended to his professional duties. Mr. Herder took an active part in fraternal and athletic work, and while he took no active part in public matters, the cause of right and free- dom ever found him a worthy sup- porter. He was a printer more than an editor, and the mechanical work of his profession came first in the conducting of the Telegram. He was affable and courteous in his inter- course, a just man in his dealings and a good citizen. Many will remember Mr. Herder's first attempt as a pub- lisher, and to him modern journalism in this country owes its beginning. The present position of the Telegram is a monument to his enterprise and mechanical skill—from the humble start to a full measure of success. Such is the life work of the man just called to his rest. After an active, useful life, he passed home "like one who draws the drapery of his couch about him, and lies down to pleasant dreams."

The Standard tenders to the be- lieved family its sincere sympathy in the loss that has come to it by the passing away of its head, an expres- sion which we feel assured is shared in by this community. Personally, we have to acknowledge many favors re- ceived from the deceased at times when necessity compelled us to seek help in an emergency—help that was always freely and courteously extend- ed.

Tarvia Prevents Dust; Tarvia Preserves Roads.

In the United States and Canada Tarvia is the standard by which all other road-binders and preservatives are judged.

Tarvia is made in three grades—"Tarvia X" for road construction, "Tarvia B" for preservation of road surface and "Tarvia K-P" for repair- ing roads. Both "Tarvia B" and "Tarvia K-P" have been used in St. John's Municipal works for several years.

"Tarvia B" actually enters the road surface, acts as a cement, and resists the tear and wear of traffic. By cementing together the dust par- ticles "Tarvia B" prevents the for- mation of dust.

After the application of "Tarvia B" to a road surface a thin layer of sand should be applied to take care of the excess liquid and to prevent tracking. This layer of sand will prevent horses from slipping and automobiles from skidding and will prolong the life of the road surface. Broken stone is not as satisfactory or as economical as sand for this purpose.

A road after being treated with "Tarvia B" does not become muddy in rainy weather, but sheds the water and dries off quickly after the rain, leaving the road in admirable condition while untreated roads are still deep with mud.

"Tarvia B" surfacing should be ap- plied annually but only when roads are in good condition and free from surplus dust. All holes and depres- sions should be repaired with fine broken stone and "Tarvia K-P."

When "Tarvia B" is applied by mechanical sprinkler, care should be taken to have men with brooms and hand sprinklers go over the ground so that excess "Tarvia B" may be brushed out and not allowed to run waste and so that bare spots be treated and the entire road surface secured.

A loose, "happy-go-lucky" applica- tion is sheer waste of time and money, "whatever is worth doing, is worth doing well."

DAMAGE DONE BY CLOUDBURST.

BINGHAMPTON, N.Y., June 5.
A cloudburst flooded the Delaware River yesterday sweeping away ten bridges and doing damage nearly \$2,000,000.

A GLUT OF MACKEREL.

HALIFAX, June 5.
Over 2,000,000 pounds of mackerel were taken by Nova Scotia fishermen last week, the average price received by them being about 3 1/2 cents per pound. The inability of dealers to handle such big catches, obliged some fishermen to accept two cents a piece for mackerel weighing four pounds.

REBELS RETREATING.

LONDON, June 5.
British troops have driven Sinn Fein- er invaders from their main position in Ulster territory, and large part of the border between North and South, now is practically a battlefield. Sinn Feiners now face seasoned and well equipped troops, with artillery, instead of the Ulster specials who have held the line for some time.

A MERE HYPOTHESES.

LONDON, June 5.
Newspapers refrain comment on the Irish situation, but the Daily News, basing its information on a despatch from Emmet, declares under its biggest headlines that a crisis has been deliberately faked for political purposes, and that provocation to war comes from the Ulster side.
