A Canadian Club Is Being Formed

First Step In the Movement Was Made by Some Citizens In Small Meeting Yesterday.

Yesterday afternoon at the conclusion of the meeting of the Calgary board of trustees, a meeting of some of the members was held for the purpose of making preliminary arrangements for organizing a Canadian club. C. W. Rowley acted as chairman and E. L. Richardson as secretary.

NEW SECRETARY BOARD OF TRADE

E. L. Richardson Promoted to the Vacant Position.

C. W. WEBSTER APPOINTED ASSISTANT SECRETARY

New Method of Election to be Adopted by Board

E. L. Richardson was appointed secretary of the Calgary board of trade at a meeting held yesterday afternoon. He has been assistant secretary for some years and for the last few months has been acting secretary. Mr. Richardson hesitated about accepting, but was pressed into it.

C. W. Webster, the newly appointed secretary of the 100,000 club, was appointed assistant secretary to the board.

Preparations were made yesterday for the annual meeting, which will be held in the city hall on Jan. 29. It was decided to inaugurate a new method of nomination and election. Nominations are to be made by mail to the secretary or in writing to that person.

The board joined with the Edmonton board to ask for better rates from railways for students, and with British Columbia companies for better express rates upon fruit.

FIRST MEETING OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

E. H. Crandell, Elected Chairman for the Year 1907

The first meeting of the new school board was held last evening in the Burns Block, when the officers for the coming year were elected, viz: Chairman—E. H. Crandell. Secretary—W. L. Waines. Chairman School Management—James Short.

SCHOOLS TO BE STARTED SOON

Functions Explained by the Deputy Minister of Agriculture

George Harcourt, of Edmonton, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, was in the city yesterday. In an interview with the Albertan he explained what good work the stock judging schools would do for the province of Alberta.

During previous years two schools lasting only two days have been held on stock in the district, which at times, was anything but satisfactory, as in these cases only the best can serve the purpose of teaching about the qualities of high class stock.

This year four schools of one week each and two schools of two weeks will be held, besides which the school has been loaned about \$50,000 worth of the best pure bred stock in the province by prominent stock keepers of Alberta, and includes two Percheron stallions imported from the States; one Clydesdale stallion; one Clydesdale mare; two Hackney horses; one infantry mount; one Shorthorn bull; three females; one prize bull, that won the sweepstakes at the spring sale here, and the July show; one Hereford bull; three females and one Polled Angus cow. For milking they have two Jerseys, two Holsteins, two Ayrshires.

In sheep they have two Oxford, two Shropshires, while in the pork line there is Berkshire sow, one Chester white sow, and two bacon type pigs. Besides pure bred animals several grades of cattle are carried around for illustrating purposes.

These schools are being beneficial to farmers and stock trade, and will have a tendency to improve the grade of cattle in Alberta. It is the first of its kind on the coast, and is a very desirable move, as it speaks well for the enthusiasm of those instrumental in carrying on the school. It must also be remembered that the farmers and stock keepers who have loaned their pure bred cattle for this purpose must have entered into the work in earnest, especially when the risk is so great.

Schools are being held at Medicine Hat during this week, and Magrath 14th to the 19th; High River 21st to 26th; Innisfail 28th to Feb. 2nd; Lacombe Feb. 5th to 16th; Edmonton Feb. 18th to March 2nd.

Calgary has not been scheduled as the stock will be brought here in connection with the spring bull sale. Mr. Harcourt was at Medicine Hat during the first three days of this week, and he was pleased with the way those present were instructed in the different points and ways of judging stock.

To encourage stock judging a grand challenge prize will be put up at the local Fair Show for competition in judging between those who have been attending the school this season.

CITIZENS BENT ON MUNICIPAL PLANT

The Bell Telephone Company Now Assessed at \$20000

Last night, E. L. Richardson, secretary of the Calgary Board of Trade, received the following communication from F. C. Peterson, western manager of the Bell Telephone Co. The message came from Fort William. It reads as follows: "My attention directed to your resolution of the 8th, inst. Owing to Calgary's unprecedented growth, our present telephone facilities inadequate of a fully satisfactory service. A new building and switch board are being built to meet requirements. I shall be pleased to meet your board in Calgary on my return from Montreal."

DECREASE OF OUR INDIANS

Statistics Show that in Alberta They are Decreasing in Numbers

AGENTS SAY THEY ARE PROGRESSING

THE HORROR OF PITTSBURG DISASTER

Bodies of 12 recovered and from 15 to 20 are Missing

Pittsburg, Jan. 10.—Partial investigation to ascertain the number of fatalities at the Eliza furnaces of the Jones & Laughlin Steel Co. Ltd. last night, when the accumulation of burning base of the large furnaces and showering tons of molten metal over about forty men was completed to night, and shows that the bodies of twelve men horribly mutilated have been recovered and from fifteen to twenty men are missing.

It is generally believed that the bodies of these were consumed by the white hot metal. Ten men are expected to die. It is doubtful if the number of men killed will ever be known. The bodies of the injured is pitiful. A number have their eyes burned out, and others were so badly injured that amputation of their limbs was necessary.

Tonight deputy coroner Laidley said that one foreigner, apparently a youth, became crazed by his injuries and before he could be prevented leaped into a pot of molten metal and was incinerated.

Mr. Hunter, who addressed the meeting first, said that Jesus came to everyone, he had been to everyone in the church that night.

Jesus always went to the humble homes and seldom to the wealthy. How seldom do we find the gospel being preached from the mansions of the rich.

Jesus was interested in business and people should always keep Him in mind during the day while at business and carry on their work for His glory.

When we hear the cry of "Fresh fish, fish, oh," do we ever think of Jesus; yet he was interested in fishing as was shown in the parable of the mitreous draught of fishes.

Mr. Hunter's address was fervent and enthusiastic. In conclusion, he said just as the martyr Stephen could look up into heaven, so could he look down on earth, and following the same theme the departed friends of those present could look down and rejoice when any one of them were converted.

Mr. Crossley, who sang the well known song, "Where is My Wandering Boy Tonight?"

Mr. Crossley, whose throat is much better, addressing the congregation said:

How lovingly and artfully can Jesus rebuke sinners. Rebukes often did more harm than good, as they caused a certain amount of hard feeling.

Criticism interfered with Christianity. Wouldn't Satan like to start the Methodists criticizing the Baptists as was shown in the parable of the Episcopalians, and so on. Don't criticize; I like to cut the devil by ignoring him.

When people tell lies of you don't criticize them but live so that the devil be believed.

The committee of criticism is disbanded in the Calgary for three months; we be to the individual who shall revive it.

Mr. Crossley said he would rather be on earth than in heaven with Jesus and would rather be in Calgary for the next month than in glory, so that he might have more souls and win his crown.

Salvation is certain if we repent. Mr. Hunter then asked those who had any special request to ask of God not for themselves to rise, and many responded.

Then those who wished the people of God to pray for them; a few more rose.

The evangelist then called for those who had been converted and said: "If you are lost tonight I will witness against you, for you are deliberately losing the opportunity to be saved."

Some ten came up to the altar rail and more who were sitting in the front seats signed testimonial cards. The meeting closed with silent prayer.
