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Municipal Nominations.

Aylmer, Malahide, Bayham, Yarmouth and Springfield return Councils by Acclamation. Fight on in South Dorchester, St. Thomas and many other Places.

While there was a goodly number of ratepayers present at the nomination meeting, held in the town hall, Monday evening, very little interest was shown. It seemed to be a fore gone conclusion that there would be no election, and this proved the case. The small number of nominees for the offices is probably a record. There will be but one change, Councillor Wegenast declining to accept and his place being taken by Fred D. King, who has had previous experience and proving his worth on the council board.

It is well that the 1914 council is to remain on duty for another year. They have done excellent service, and intricate problems, which actually demand previous knowledge, will have to be carefully handled in 1915.

Mayor Wagner was the first speaker at the public meeting, and in an exhaustive and comprehensive address he gave a good account of his stewardship, and dwelling principally on the reasons for raising the assessment values, and lowering the rate of taxation from 28 to 26 mills; the extra expense incurred by the construction of permanent roads, the conferences had with Secord & Sons who so far have refused to commit themselves as to their intention to make good the defects on the concrete roads constructed by them, and stated that the town at present was holding \$18,500 due the contractors. A part of this will be paid over when the last work on John St. north is completed.

Considerable discussion took place in regard to the contract for supplying water to the Condenser.

He also touched on Hydro Railway matters and expressed disapproval of Aylmer having merely a stub line from Lyons.

Mayor Wagner thanked the ratepayers for their expression of confidence in electing him for another term and promised his best services.

Reeve McKenney gave a good report of his work in the county council, and proudly stated that Elgin county was in a better and more prosperous condition than 90 per cent. of the counties in Ontario. In the year's work there is a deficit of \$1,628 caused entirely by the generosity in extending grants to continuation classes in public schools, that he heartily endorsed.

W. H. Wegenast frankly stated that he did not approve of the way the town business was conducted, which was the reason for his withdrawal.

J. W. Cline was thankful for retaining the confidence of the electors, and made plain the fact that he was not afflicted with cold feet at any time when a vote was demanded which might bring criticism upon him.

Albert Trim, who was chairman of the roads committee of 1914, and was really the hardest worked member of the board, and by the way did his work thoroughly and well, kept the audience in an uproar of laughter, in a characteristically speech. He started out by saying he had a bone to pick with the mayor. Last year he came into the council a green, non-suspecting member, and he blamed the mayor for taking advantage of his innocence by saddling upon him the chairmanship of the road committee, which had kept him moving pretty lively throughout the year. He liked the mayor, however. Of course true love never runs smooth, and they had had some lively differences, but were the best of friends. At first he started to keep a record of the work he did, but found it would fill too big a book. However he had done the best he could for the town, and his work spoke for itself. If the people were satisfied, he was, and promised to do even better work next year. It is to be hoped Mr. Trim will continue as chairman of roads. He is the best man for the job Aylmer ever had.

F. D. King did not make an address owing no doubt to the lateness of the hour.

W. J. Mann, J. E. Scott and Henry Little were not present when called on. The Aylmer Council for 1915 will be: Mayor, F. L. Wagner; Reeve, Oscar McKenney; Councillors, Albert Trim, J. W. Cline, W. J. Mann, Henry Little, J. E. Scott and F. D. King. E. A. Caughell was elected water and light commissioner, also by acclamation.

As usual the town hall, Aylmer, was well filled at Malahide's nomination meeting Monday. There were a large number of nominations, but as the council of 1914 appeared to have given good satisfaction, all new nominees withdrew, leaving the council of this year re-elected by acclamation. This is a splendid tribute to their efficiency. Following is the list: Reeve, F. G. Pineo; deputy-reeve, W. T. Hare; councillors, E. B. Hill, Chas. Ingram and Solon Chambers.
