DUTY AND DOCTORS.

To the Editor of the Express.

Sir,—A few rather peculiar cases
have come to my notice during the
past week that have caused me some
anxious moments. There have been
so many cases of so-called "graft" in
the papers lately, that I have been
forced to conclude that there is a cer-
tain amount of that same "graft" in
the recruiting schemes that are in
force to-day. For instance, certain
Aylmer young men enlisted in the 91st
last fall. Since that time they and
their families have been drawing pay
from the Government and the Pat-
riotic Fund. Now that a regular army
doctor comes along, these men are
turned down, and all that they have
received comes out of the pockets of
the people, and they will never reach
the Front. Why is this state of affairs
allowed to exist? Why were not
these men turned down in the first
place? Answer me this. I cast no
reflection upon the men thus treated,
far from it. I cast no reflection upon
the officers of their regiment; but I
do think there is a "nigger in the
wood-pile" somewhere. These men
have given up good positions, and
now that they are turned down, they
are out of a job, because their former
employers have filled their positions.
Is this fair? Again: A certain young
man from Aylmer went to London to
enlist. The doctor there said he
would have to have a minor opera-
tion. The young man said, "Very
well, go ahead." The London doctor
said, "If you had been a resident of
London for twelve months, you could
be operated upon for nothing; as it
is, you will have to pay \$35 to have
the operation performed." Why is
this? Is he a better servant of our
King by living in London for twelve
months before enlisting than he is in
living in Aylmer? But here is the
joker. This same young man went
down to Tillsonburg and enlisted in

DREADNOUGHTS AID BRITAIN IN THE WAR WITHOUT FIRING A SHOT.

Washington, D.C., April 17.—Dread-
noughts have won the greatest vic-
tory of the European War without
firing a shot. Assistant-Secretary
Roosevelt, of the Navy, told the
House Naval Committee. With enough
Dreadnoughts, he said, the United
States would win a "bloodless vic-
tory" in a war.

"To-day the United States is richer
and weaker than ever before in its
history in comparison with other
powers," Mr. Roosevelt said, explain-
ing that the nation has great po-
tential resources, but a "handful of
an army" and a navy weaker than
several powers for immediate defence.
By keeping the foe's fleet off the
sea, Mr. Roosevelt said, the British
Dreadnoughts had attained the aim
for which they were built.

That there is a possibility at least
of this nation's becoming involved in
war with a victor in Europe was as-
serted by Mr. Roosevelt. He pictured
disaster in a war with a fleet twice as
strong, expressing belief that the
United States fleet would be wiped
out, the Panama Canal, and United
States possessions lost, and the nation
"bottled up" and open to invasion.

In reply to a suggestion that Euro-
pean belligerents will be exhausted at
the close of the war and be little in-
clined to continue arming, Mr. Roose-
velt said:

"It is entirely problematical. But,
judging by history, the best guess is
that they will continue. We cannot
tell yet if the war is going to result
in a draw, with everybody weak,
down and out. If a victory for either
side results, history shows the victor
will have enormous resources. If
there is a victorious side there is a
probability or a possibility that we
might get mixed up with that victor-
ious side. To-day we have great po-
tential resources, but nothing to with-
stand an immediate shock."

Mr. Roosevelt said the Department
has official knowledge that Britain
has increased her naval tonnage by
1,000,000 tons since the war began. He
said, however, that Britain would
hesitate long before sending her fleet
against Germany's fortified base at
Heligoland.

"If," he added, "it meets the German
navy alone on the high seas, it would
be destroyed undoubtedly."

Thirsty Chicks.

Abnormal thirst in incubator chicks
is generally caused from keeping
them too long in a poorly ventilated
and too warm incubator. This seldom
happens in winter, but occasionally in
hot weather. To guard against this,
keep them from panting by lowering
the temperature somewhat, and in-
creasing the ventilation.

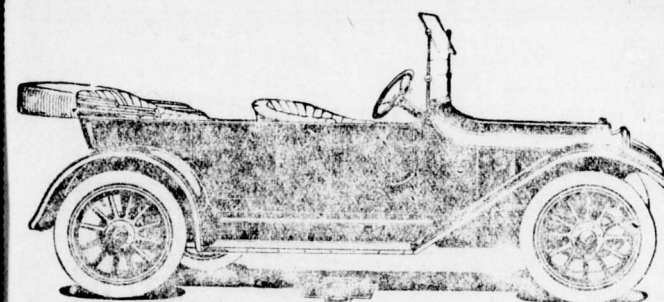
