SONS OF ENGLAND.

The New Constitution—Sons of Englishwomen Eligible for Membership.

WOODSTOCK, March 18.—The Sons of England Grand Lodge, which was in convention here during last week, decided by a straight vote that the order was not prepared to create a sovereign lodge with district grand lodges, but that the present Supreme Grand Lodge would answer all requirements for a time, if certain amendments were made to the constitution. The committee which had drafted the new constitution, however, had incorporated the machinery for creating district grand lodges; this was allowed to stand to a large extent, so that it will be possible in the meantime to put the balance into operation or create the Provincial Grand Lodges. It is anticipated that in a year or two, when the subordinate lodges have familiarized themselves with the scheme, the present antagonism to the matter will die out, and the extended organization which the expansion of the order demands will be approved.

The most important modification made was in the qualification of membership. Hitherto a member must have been English-born or the son of an English father, but this restriction has been now modified to allow the admission of the sons of English women as well, so that in future any candidate who has either parent English-born will be eligible. It is expected that this change will increase the membership of the order.

JUBILEE SERVICES.

Young People's Night at Talbot Street Baptist Church.

Interesting Addresses by Dr. Buchanan, Mrs. (Rev.) Ira Smith, Mrs. Doolittle and Rev. W. Hartley.

Last evening was the young people's night in the jubilee celebration of the Talbot Street Baptist Church. The gathering was a large and attentive one. Mr. E. B. McDermid presided, and incidental to the addresses a duet by the Misses Harrison and pleasing anthems by the choir were rendered. Rev. E. M. Dudson, B.A., will address the meeting tomorrow evening on "Baptist Principles." The following is a synopsis of the evening's addresses.

H. E. BUCHAN, M.A., M.D.

The subject was, "A young Christian's share in the development of an ideal church." He was not sure just what constituted an ideal church, but if we go back to the foundation of the first church at Jerusalem we will get a good idea of an ideal church. The members continued steadfastly in the Apostles' doctrine, teaching and fellowship. He thought this was the church of fellowship, and one which adhered strictly to the observance of the Lord's Supper and other doctrines. In this ideal church there was no separation between the rich and the poor; they lived together in love, and were also a very reverent people. All these people were young Christians. If young Christians of these days are going to aid in the development of such a church they must be consecrated to the Lord and be steadfast in his service. Young and old Christians should hold fellowship with one another. No young Christian should neglect the prayer meeting. We should have a fear and reverence of God. There must be love in all true Christians. All young Christians who will do these things will aid greatly in building up an ideal church.

MRS. (REV.) IRA SMITH.

To be young and be a Christian is a most desirable thing. When you are young is the time to form that indestructible structure, character. Most people are looking for some impossibility to happen. Too many lay the valuable hours of life slip away without improvement, like the grains of sand slipping through your fingers. Many people who would like to associate with vicious people delight to read of them in dime novels on the plea that they should know error and thus seek to avoid it. How can a person who reads such books not be contaminated by their influence? Too many young people form a taste for such "racy" reading, as it is called. Read biographies of great men and profit by their knowledge and success. Many people feel that they have no incentive to study. The heart and mind of the Saviour were engaged in a scheme of such magnitude that the angels have not yet found out its meaning, and it will be a study for all eternity. If the social and endeavor meetings are dull and spiritless it is for a lack of thought. If the young people would put their opinions in the best language at their command and speak at these meetings they would soon find it much easier and become almost perfect.

MRS. J. H. DOOLITTLE, SPARTA.

The subject was, "Who is the Greatest?" When Christ was on earth the disciples used to ask who was the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. Every Christian has a higher ambition than merely to be saved. We chafe under the unequal division of talents, wealth and position, but if we have the true Spirit of Christ we will accept of our lot and bear up easily under our burdens. Jesus told his disciples that unless they came as little children they could not enter the kingdom of heaven, and so we have to humble ourselves to the will of God. Now that we see the Saviour's teaching in this matter, let us make a practical application of it. Let us do the work we are given each day without grumbling. Do not let us think that on account of limited opportunities the results of our lives must necessarily be small. In our anxiety to do we sometimes forget to be. It is sometimes easier to do than to be. The love of Christ will drive away evil and prevent many of the humble jars. The Lord requires us to be humble ourselves and work faithfully.

REV. W. HARTLEY, GUELPH.

The subject was "The Young Christian's Mastery of Self." It is a very important topic. If you want to make much of yourself you have to start when young, and so it is important to learn to master self. In the first place, we must be known to ourselves, and next there is the subjection of body to mind, or of the lower to the higher. If we want to do God's work we must not think it any trouble. No man or woman can ever fully master himself until they have given themselves fully into the service of Christ. The mastery of self will bring all forces into harmony. This will enable us to do our own responsibility. Many people do not act for themselves, they are much like a flock of sheep. It will keep us from finding excuses for not doing things that we should do. The path we will follow, we will turn neither to the right or left. When we decide to do a thing, let us always press on until it is finished. Those who have the greatest mastery are those who have complete mastery of themselves.
