Referees are notified to watch closely the riding and actions of riders of both classes. Bereft of Royalty

The Past Week in London a "Social Blank."

Talk of Princess Victoria Wed-ding Wm. Waldorf Astor.

Expected Marriage of Sir Robert Peel Broken Off.

The British Postoffice Department Cleared \$18,000,000 in the Year.

An Inquiry into the British Prison System Demanded.

LONDON, Aug. 28.—The past week has been a social blank. Every one of importance who is not enjoying a visit to the resorts of the continent is either shooting grouse on the moors, deer stalking on the hills, or preparing for the partridge shooting which opens Sept. 1. London is bereft of royalty, and the members of the royal family will remain scattered until the reunion in Balmoral early in October to welcome the Czar and Czarina. The Queen starts on Tuesday for Balmoral.

The visit of the Czar and Czarina to England is a family affair, but, nevertheless, it is no secret that the Marquis of Salisbury's visit to Osborne on Wednesday last was due to the anxiety of the Queen to be fully posted on the Foreign Office's views as to the Anglo-Russian policy, so as not to make any mistake in the event of the Czar's conversation trenching upon high politics.

One of the topics of conversation is the melodramatic rupture of Sir Robert Peel's week's old engagement to Ella, daughter of Lord Ashton. It has set the tongues of society wagging rapidly and has called forth the publication in the Daily News (of which Lord Ashton is part owner) of a statement announcing that the engagement was unauthorized and that there is not the remotest possibility of such a marriage taking place. It is now reported that the rupture was caused by the dancer's receipt of a letter from a lady who was a friend of Mrs. Langtry and Abingdon Baird. The young lady, it appears, showed this letter to her father, and the latter promptly gave Sir Robert Peel who was staying at Rylands, his conge. The lovers first met a month ago, and it was a case of love at first sight. Sir Robert Peel invited Lady Ashton and Miss Ella to Drayton, and on the first day of their visit he proposed and was accepted. Lord Ashton consented to the engagement and promised to supplement Sir Robert Peel's income of \$25,000 by giving his daughter \$5,000 yearly.

POSSIBLE ROYAL WEDDING.
The discussion of the rumor of the possible marriage of Mr. William Waldorf Astor to Princess Victoria of Wales has been reopened by a leading society journal, which regards the match as quite possible, saying it will give the greatest satisfaction to all intelligent people in the English-speaking world, adding: "There has been more than one royal marriage in Europe during the past few years, which was not so promising as would be the marriage of the daughter of a future King to a man of good physical and mental and moral character, and who, under such circumstances, would speedily be promoted to a dukedom."

A paragraph, which is read in a variety of ways, is in circulation here to the effect that the Prince of Wales is recovering his old spirits and is resuming many of his earlier ways.

ANOTHER MATRIMONIAL AFFAIR.
The wisest interest is taken here in the nuptials of Jean de Reszke, who is to be married to the Countess de Mailly Neale. Both the lady and the famous tenor are Catholics, and they cannot marry after the former's divorce from her husband, except by a dispensation from the Pope. It is believed this has been obtained, and the wedding is likely to take place on De Reszke's estate in Poland during the early part of October. It is also under-

stood that the tenor will abandon the stage in 1898.

THE SOLENT FATALITY.
It is reported that Messrs. William and the Prince of Wales have been exchanging telegrams of an unfriendly character relative to the fatality in the Solent, by which Baron von Zedwitz lost his life in a collision between his yacht Isolda and Emperor William's yacht Meteor. The Emperor is inquiring into the affair on his own account.

CHAMBERLAIN'S ACTIVITY.
The nucleus of the commercial exhibition projected by Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, with the view to revitalizing British trade with the colonies, is opened, and is attracting considerable attention. It consists of specimens of the foreign goods which are supplanting British goods, and shows that the principal rivals of British merchants are those of the United States and Germany. The comments on the exhibition agree that the display is an eloquent proof of the great changes which are occurring in Great Britain's commerce, and the opinion is expressed that the difficulty is not Great Britain's inability to compete in prices with other countries, but that it is the failure of British manufacturers to adapt themselves to the demands of the markets. In connection with the above it is interesting to note the departure of parties of engineers to East and West Africa, presumably sent by Mr. Chamberlain to report on railway schemes with the view of opening up new markets.

OFFICIAL REPORTS.
The general post office report just issued shows a profit of \$18,160,000, the most prosperous year in its history. A grand total of 3,030,000,000 pieces of mail were delivered. The value of property found in letters which were collected in the dead letter offices is \$500,000; the transmitted postal orders amounted to \$54,000,000; 78,839,610 telegrams were sent, and there was deposited in the savings bank department \$145,000,000, of which an amount \$347,000,000 was checked out.

THE RELEASED IRISH PRISONERS.
The pitiable mental and physical condition of the recently released Irish political prisoners is resulting in the demand for an inquiry into the prison system here, and the affair is likely to be a burning question in the next Parliament.

The 50th report of the lunacy commission shows an increase of 2,355 lunatics, the largest ever recorded. The number of recoveries is 2,133 per cent below that of 1894. The total number of lunatics in England and Wales is 95,446. Hereditary influence figures as the most potent factor in the production of insanity.

IN LUCK.

A Good Find—Gas and Oil Struck on Pelee Island.

Kingsville, Ont., Aug. 29.—A large pump was placed in the oil well on the Pelee Island, struck by the Pelee Gas and Oil Company, Pelee Island, and by an actual test five barrels of oil per hour, or over 100 barrels per day, was pumped. The oil tests forty per cent. The well also supplies gas for pumping and lighting purposes, and for running drilling machinery in another well, being put down about 400 yards distant. For the present the oil will be taken per boat to Sarnia and transhipped to Petroba. An artesian flow of pure water comes up outside of the pipe free from mineral, and good for drinking purposes. The Standard Gas and Oil Company have a well nearly completed, and with the best of prospects, twelve hundred yards away from the Pelee well.
