LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—Mr. O. E. Collins, of Toronto, general manager of the Union Credit and Protective Association, is in the city on business.
—A Port Stanley correspondent says: "Mr. L. G. Jarvis and family have removed to London, where they will in future reside. Their many friends here regret their removal. Mr. Jarvis will be missed by the school board, by Masonic circles and by the Reform Association."

—A "Ladies' Aid" in connection with Dawn Mills Methodist Church, has recently been organized. The first social is to be held at the parsonage on the 17th inst. Miss Ellen Smith, of London South, is engaged in successful revival work in Carmel Church along with the pastor.

The annual tea meeting and literary entertainment of the Hamilton street (Methodist) mission was held and proved highly successful, both socially and financially, the following ladies and gentlemen participating in the exercises of the evening: Mesdames McCutcheon, Stead and Brown; Miss McDonald; Mrs. Raymond; Dodd, Lea and Allen; and Messrs. Bartlett, Park, Chambers, A. George, A. Garman, J. Foot, Johnson, Dock and Hickson. The proceedings were varied by a short financial statement by Treasurer McNeil, and a spirited address by Rev. Charles Smith. Rev. J. R. Gundy occupied the chair in his usual affable manner.

The London Hunt.
A general meeting of the London Hunt was held at the Trenchard House last evening, with Major Smith in the chair and some 25 members present. Evidently the hunt is booming, as nine new names were added to the roll at last night's session, and thirteen applications for membership were handed in for approval. The coming event of the hunting season—the hunt itself—was discussed, and it was generally conceded that the right time would be about two weeks before Lent.

Death of Mr. Henry Boddy.
Mr. Henry Boddy, aged 26, eldest son of Venerable Archdeacon Boddy, of St. Peter's Church, died suddenly Tuesday at 9 o'clock, of typhoid fever, at the residence of his father, 21 Winchester street. The deceased arrived home from the United States only four days ago. While on the other side he was taken ill, and started for Toronto immediately, but was very low when he arrived here. Mr. Boddy had won for himself a wide reputation as an eloquent speaker. He was well and favorably known in London. His death will be a shock to his many warm friends. The funeral will be private.

World's Fair News.
The first shipment of Ontario's products for the World's Fair, consisting of 200 barrels of apples and pears, left Hamilton a few days ago for Chicago. They will be preserved in cold storage until the exhibition opens. President M. Pettit, of the Fruit Growers' Association is arranging a splendid collection of small fruits and about 2,000 jars will be sent. There are going to be samples of Canadian grain, both in straw and sacks, which will be packed in cases lined with tin, and when they arrive at the fair will be put in large jars, sealed and labelled, so that visitors may know from what Province they come. The Canadian building will contain two offices each for the Dominion commissioners, Ontario, Quebec and one for the other Provinces. There is to be a reception room for the Canadians when they grow tired, and it is to be supplied with the Canadian paper. There will also be a post-office for the Canadian people exclusively.

A Stray Boy.
A boy giving his name as Ernest Hammond, 11 years old, and claiming to belong to Owen Sound, called at the Herald office this morning and asked for work. He said he had lived in Owen Sound about three years, and had been in London for the last two weeks. He came up from London this morning on a ticket given him by a lady in Owen Sound. He had been there, he said, had no work for the boy, but before going the little fellow intimated that he would like to get to Toronto, where he claimed to have relatives. He was directed to Mayor Hodgins. The lad had a somewhat disconcerting way and in activities were afterwards made of Mayor Hodgins if anything had been done in his behalf. Mr. Hodgins said the boy had not visited him, and Mayor Hodgins said a boy answering the description had been given a pass to London about two weeks ago. The matter was afterwards reported to the police, and from the description it is thought that the boy is one of two lads who are wanted at Port Huron, whence they ran away. The lad has since been arrested. He has a ticket from London to Allanford in his pocket good till Nov. 20. He says he got the ticket in London this morning. (Stratford Herald.)

THURSDAY'S POLICE COURT.

The Magistrate Has a Short Session—Annie Norris, Larceny and Vagrancy Cases on the Docket.

Annie Norris pleaded guilty before the police magistrate this morning to a charge of having stolen a silver card-case and a fan from the Clarence House, where she remained last night. Sentence was suspended. The articles were recovered.

Clara Dalimatter charged Jas. Springer with having assaulted her. He called at her residence on Richmond street last evening, and because she would not admit him he kicked the lamp which she held in her hand, striking her on the forehead. Springer was afterwards arrested in the Grigg House by P. C. Teehey. He resisted arrest and the constable had to administer a blow with his handcuffs on the head. Bail was accepted for his appearance on Tuesday.

Timothy Sullivan pleaded guilty on a charge of vagrancy and drunkenness, and sentence was suspended. He has been arrested many times although yet a very young man. His home training has been sadly neglected, both his parents being addicted to the use of strong drink. Last Saturday night he and a companion met Henry Stewart on Dundas street near the bridge, and Stewart gave them 50c. to buy liquor. They accompanied him along Thames street and up King to Talbot. Here they parted, Stewart going north. When he arrived at the rear of the City Hotel Sullivan came running up and jumped on his back. They scuffled, and Stewart was getting the better of his assailant when P. C. Black came along and arrested them both on a charge of drunkenness. Stewart was discharged.

Geo. Rawlings did not appear as the complainant against Ira B. Harris on a charge of assault, and he will be served with a summons to appear on Tuesday.

SUPPER, SONG AND SENTIMENT.

Annual Supper of Canadian Order of Oddfellows, Manchester Unity.
—A Pleasant Affair.

The local members of the Canadian Order of Oddfellows, Manchester Unity, held their annual supper at the City Hotel last evening. About 100 brethren and invited guests enjoyed the many good things provided by the genial proprietors. Past Grand Carter was chairman and in a neat speech he introduced the toast list.

"The Governor-General and Lieutenant-Governor of Canada," was honored by the company singing the National Anthem, followed with a song by George Stickle. Bros. R. Tremblay and Garside were called on for songs, but instead of singing they made a few remarks.

Grand Master Collins, in replying to the toast of the "Canadian Order of Oddfellows, Manchester Unity," hoped that this would not be the last occasion on which he would dine with London Oddfellows. He always tried to fulfill faithfully the duties of his office. The doors of the order were ever open to receive brethren from the motherland. The organization was loyal to his country and to all countries in which it existed. Manchester Unity was in England one of the most prosperous of fraternal institutions in that favored land. None of the money of the organization was sent abroad in foreign countries. What would be the object of that? The wives and children of Oddfellows were also benefited. Since the speaker had been grand master every claim—without a single exception—had been paid in full and within the prescribed time. What did a few hundred dollars amount to in a society like this? He was not ashamed to acknowledge that he was born in Ireland. It was a small country, but no country of its size on the face of the earth was receiving so much attention. A great and good man, Hon. Edward Blake, had been sent to help solve the great problem, but he thought that he would not be successful in bringing it to the desired issue.

District Secretary Cochran said that the order was progressive in St. Thomas. There was also a large juvenile lodge and he had every confidence that it would prove a feeder for the adult lodge.

Past Grand Warden Gillett, of London, said it was a grand thing to belong to an order which extended over the entire globe. On Jan. 1 last Manchester Unity had 695, 687 members, with a capital of \$6,981,339. The total receipts during the last year had amounted to \$1,090,655, and there was a substantial cash balance on hand.

After a song by Dr. Skinner the toast list was handed to Vice-Chairman Past Grand Bowman.

"The Army, Navy and Volunteers" was responded to by Sgt.-Major Garside, of the Seventh Fusiliers, who said that the city was justly proud of the battalion. In Col. Payne they had an officer who used every means to bring the battalion to a high standard.

"The Mercantile Interests" called for a speech from W. H. Ferguson, and a song from Dr. Graham.

"Our Visiting Brothers" was responded to by a song by Bro. Carter.

Dr. McLennan, of the Canadian Order of Foresters, replied to "Sister Societies."

"The Ladies," "The Press" and "Our Hosts" were honored and the company dispersed about midnight.
