Pauline Johnson, the Canadian Indian authoress. will be glad to know that she has attained the object of her trip across the ocean in the accepting by a first-class publishing house of her book of poems, which will be issued simultaneously about Christmas ime in London, New York and Toronto. When looking over her manuscript she says a prominent publisher pronounced some of her poems "wonderful," and that she is much elated over her success. She has attended any number of receptions, and at one of these Lady Helen Blake presented her with a beautiful jewel containing thirty-two pearls.
