favor of the Ontario boys.—A paragraph appeared in yesterday's
ADVERTISER, stating that Edward Jury, a
respected resident of Oak street, London
West, had been arrested for refusing to
comply with a judge's order to pay to his
wife, Sarah Rose Jury, \$3 a week alimony.
Mr. Jury was arrested, but any order made
never issued against him for the amount
stated. The wife has entered an action,
which will be tried at the Fall Assizes,
asking for \$200 alimony and interim al-
imony of \$3 per week, and a lien
upon the property in London West.
In her statement of claim Mrs.
Jury says that the domestic relations in
her household have not been of the most
harmonious; that Jury has more than once
threatened her, and that he expressed his
intention of selling out and leaving for
England with the proceeds of the sale.
These statements Mr. Jury emphatically
denies. Jury was detained in jail only a
few hours, bail being furnished by a lead-
ing manufacturer of the city. Mrs. Jury
will be examined before Col. Shanly on
Wednesday, and a motion to set aside the
order will be made before Judge Edward
Elliott on Thursday. W. H. Bartram is
acting for the plaintiff and McEvoy, Wilson
& Pope for the defendant.

Miss Johnson in England.

The many friends of Miss E. Pauline
Johnson, the Canadian Indian authoress,
will be glad to know that she has attained
the object of her trip across the ocean in
it being a first-class publishing
house of her book of poems, which will be
issued simultaneously about Christmas
time in London, New York and Toronto.
When looking over her manuscript she says
a prominent publisher pronounced some of
her poems "wonderful," and that she is
much pleased over her success. She has at-
tended any number of receptions, and at
one of these Lady Helen Blake pre-
sented her with a beautiful jewel con-
taining thirty-two pearls. Miss Johnson
says that "Next to the gift of my own
townspeople on leaving home I value this
more than any other gift that I have ever
received." It is a poet's life surrounded
by a star. During a reception at the
Royal Academy she was the recipient of
marked attention by the president, Sir
Frederick Leighton. She returns home for
a day or so at the end of the present month
and then starts on a two months' profes-
sional tour to the Canadian Pacific coast.
She writes that only for the damp English
climate, her visit would have been simply
perfect, but this affected her throat very
seriously on several occasions.

Repairing and Insuring the Schools.

A special meeting of the Board of Educa-
tion was held last night to discuss the re-
port of No. 2 committee on the condition
of London public schools. The committee
of which Trustee Blackwell is chairman,
had recently made a thorough inspection
of each school. Satisfaction was ex-
pressed at the condition in which
everything was found, and the repairs
recommended in the report were
trivial. The Colborne street school
requires new seats in two rooms, the tower
wants repairing and these seats in another room
require attention. In the other schools,
kalsomining, repainting, oiling of floors,
painting of circles and the supplying of
several teachers' chairs were about the only
changes necessary. The division of the
school insurance was recommended as
follows: Beidome & Brown, \$5,000; A.
Gillman, \$4,000; Butler & Son, \$5,000; E.
Hammond, \$5,000; G. M. Gunn & Son,
\$8,000; G. H. Merritt, \$5,000; J. A.**Chief Attraction.**

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
