Board of Works.

Chief of Police Wants the Speed of Bicycles Regulated.

City Will Supply the Remedy for Maple Tree Borers.

No New Street This Year from Quebec to Charlotte—Owners Complain About the High Boulevard at Dundas Center.

The regular meeting of the Board of Works was held last night, when another batch of business was hustled through. The members present were Ald. Parnell (chairman), Wm. Heaman, O'Meara, Cooper, Pritchard and Dreaney.

The first business was the consideration of a new sidewalk on Pall Mall street, from Tapp's corner to Waterloo street. Mr. Christie and Mr. Tapp were again before the board to urge them to take action in the matter. Mr. Tapp complained that unless something was done he would be able to keep his tenants. Ald. O'Meara moved that the work be done. Carried.

A communication was read from Wm. Baker re the condition of Beaconsfield avenue, warning the committee of their liability for any damage resulting therefrom. A letter was read from Chief Williams, asking that the committee recommend to the council a bylaw to regulate the speed of bicycles on the principal streets, he having received numerous complaints about the matter.

Ald. O'Meara—If there is no bylaw to that effect, I think there should be one.

Ald. Dreaney—There is a bylaw to prevent a man from driving too fast on the street.

Ald. Pritchard's motion to prepare a bylaw regulating the speed was lost, on motion of Ald. O'Meara, the bylaw being referred to the engineer.

The Bell Telephone Company's communication requesting that the city attend to the trimming of trees, the same to be charged to them, was received.

Ald. Parnell moved that the boarders and the city trees, said he found that the preparation advertised by the city engineer was not very extensively used, and submitted a recommendation from Ald. Bennett that the matter be placed in the hands of one man in that ward, who shall apply the mixture to the trees of parties wishing it.

done, the city to make the mixture, and permit them to charge a fee for each tree. No compulsion in the matter will be allowed. If parties wish their trees done, they will pay the fee, and if they don't want it done, they needn't have it.

Ald. Bennett he found that on Queen's avenue, where many of the fine trees were, that no one was using the stuff at all.

Ald. O'Meara moved that \$25 worth of the mixture be made by the engineer, and kept in the cellar of the City Hall, with instructions to people wishing it, to be supplied to them at a price he thought reasonable. Carried.

Messrs. Jarvis and Dodd, property owners in the vicinity of the Dundas Street Market, complained of the way in which the city was allowing the church people to raise their property. The gentleman said the church people had not carried out the representations made to the engineer, and claimed that earth was being drawn out of the streets, and that the ground was now two feet higher than the sidewalk.

Engineer Graydon—As soon as I received Mr. Dodd's letter I notified the church people to stop the work.

The matter was left in the hands of the chairman, member for the ward, and the engineer, on motion of Ald. Heaman.

The communication from Mr. Bickett regarding fencing and filling in of certain excavations on Wellington street explained by that gentleman, who appeared, and stated his case. The matter will be investigated by the engineer, who will report upon the matter at the next meeting.

The communication from the council stated that a motion had passed that body favoring the erection of drinking fountains at the corners of Dundas and Adelaide streets, and of Wellington and Dundas, and on the Market Square; also a small hydrant on the dry stand.

Ald. Dreaney—It costs me more for people drinking from my tap than it does for my own horses.

Ald. O'Meara moved that one be placed at the corner of Adelaide and Dundas streets. Carried. The remaining portion was filed.

Application was received from A. E. Farnecombe for appointment on the city's staff in the engineer's office.

The engineer explained that he was short-handed, which left his office without anyone to help him.

Laid on the table for a week. A letter was read from Fraser & Fraser, on behalf of Levi Lewis, who has an old claim against the city. The matter was left to the chairman, the mayor and the city solicitor, to decide what action under the circumstances was best.

The first clause of the motion was passed, and the streets will be cleaned on Saturday nights, but instead of being flooded, they will be watered earlier in the morning.

Ald. Cooper's motion that the men be paid a quarter of a day for two hours at night cleaning the streets, was dropped.

Engineer Graydon reported that cost of laying a drain in Hunt's old mill race would be \$70. He asked that the work be done.

Ald. Pritchard moved that the recommendation be carried out, and the work proceeded with. He drew attention to the state of the old mill race, as there was stagnant water there. The engineer replied that the property in question was the street railway's, and

that he had notified them that something must be done.

On motion of Ald. Pritchard the matter was recommended to the Board of Health, urging them to take the matter up, as much danger existed of contracting fever.

Ald. Dreaney drew attention to the fact that the street railway had left the road in a bad shape on Dundas street by not filling in the track. He said Mr. Carr promised to have the street and have it done, but that had not been carried out. He also spoke about no extension being under way, and the engineer explained that the street railway company had eighteen months from the date of the agreement to make the extension.

The question of opening up a street from Quebec to Charlotte streets was taken up, but nothing was done in the matter. Ald. Dreaney thought it was not right to fence so large a community in and keep them there. It was laid over until next year.

Ald. Parnell stated that the expenditures to date had been \$7,684.41, a little higher than last year, but they were practically the same, as the city had a large quantity of gravel and stone supplies on hand.

Ald. Dreaney moved that the engineer be instructed to bring in the amount expended in each ward in the pay sheet.

The engineer stated it to be utterly impossible for him to do any more at present. He said the street railway company's accounts had not been posted, while he and his assistant had to work many extra hours to keep up at all.

THE BAPTIST WOMEN.

Thursday's Session of the Mission Convention—Officers Elected.

Chatham, May 22.—At the Baptist Women's Missionary convention yesterday, an important resolution, embodying the suggested basis on which the Indian fund is to be in future administered, and which was amended by the convention of Manitoba and the Northwest Territories, was submitted, and after discussion adopted, the following resolution being passed:

"That this convention, assembled in Chatham, expresses its approval of the suggested basis, as amended by the convention of Manitoba and the Northwest Territories, also the Women's Society, and trust that it will be accepted by the Baptist convention of Ontario and Quebec, assembled at Montreal."

The abolition of the Indian committee was also voted on and approved, subject to the work being taken up by the general committee.

At the afternoon session a discussion took place on the question, "How can the spirit of missions be encouraged and raised to its proper standard in the churches and in the hearts of those who love the cause of Christ?"

Greetings were received from the sister societies. Mrs. J. A. Boyd, Toronto, read an admirable paper on "Indian work," and was thanked therefor. A most exciting was conducted by Mrs. J. F. Barker, of Hamilton. A spirited discussion arose on the question of how to increase circle membership, in which half a dozen members took part, all giving valuable suggestions.

The Queen and Her Contemporaries.

Next Sunday, May 24, will be the 77th anniversary of the birth of Queen Victoria, the oldest female sovereign who ever sat on the throne of England. The Queen is afflicted with rheumatism or gout, but her doctors take the best care of her health, so that she may yet have years of life.

The oldest king in Europe is Christian IX, of Denmark, who last month entered upon the 78th year of his age. He has worn the crown for 33 years.

The King of Sweden and Norway, Oscar II., is in the 67th year of his age, and has wielded the scepter since the year 1872.

The Emperor of Austria, Francis Joseph I., will be 66 years old in August next, and he has sat on the throne for 48 years.

The King of the Belgians, Leopold II., is in the 42nd year of his age, and in the 11th year of his reign.

The King of Saxony is in his 68th year.

The King of Italy, Humbert I., is in the 43rd year of his life, and in the 17th year of his reign.

The King of the Hellenes, George I., is 51 years old, and has ruled Greece for 33 years.

The Sultan of Turkey, Abdul Hamid II., is 44, and has been the ruler of the Turkish Empire for 20 years.

The King of Roumania, Charles I., is in the 48th year of his age.

These are the more elderly of the crowned royal sovereigns of Europe.

Among the younger European sovereigns are the Emperor of Germany, 37; the King of Portugal, 33; the Czar of Russia, 28; the King of Servia, 20; the Queen of the Netherlands, 17; and the King of Spain, 19. In the Netherlands there is a queen regent, and also in Spain. Pope Leo XIII., who is not a temporal ruler, is in the 77th year of his age, born March 2, 1810.

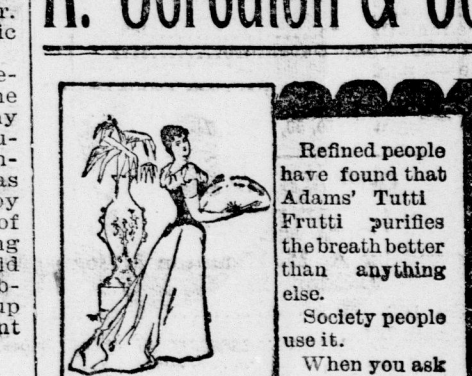
