Mr. Wm. Baker, one of the pioneer farmers of the Gore of Westminster, died suddenly at his home near Littlewood on Sunday, Sept. 10, 1899, the result of a stroke of apoplexy, aged 67 years. He was a native of England, and came to Canada in early life. He was a connection of the Penhales, Routledges, and other well-known families in Elgin and Middlesex counties, all of whom with many others, mourn his death. He leaves a family of four daughters and two sons. The funeral took place on Monday at the North street cemetery, Lambeth, being conducted by Rev. Mr. Cosens.

Chamberlain's Note

Regarded as Rather Moderate in Its Tone.

The Real Dispute Left to the Suggested Conference.

Matter of Suzerainty Passed Over or Ignored.

Indications That a Peaceful Solution of the Trouble is Probable.

London, Sept. 13.—Owing to the understanding that Mr. Chamberlain's note is to be published simultaneously in London and Pretoria only an inadequate summary has yet been telegraphed. The London papers are inclined to withhold comment until the text is available. Despite the fact that the note is described as an ultimatum, the balance of opinion tends to regard it as a rather moderate document, since apparently, it does not fix a definite time limit, leaves the real crux of the dispute for the proposed conference, and does not raise the question of suzerainty. In a word, the note seems to leave the way open to further negotiations. The Times, which considers the summary obviously imperfect, says: "It is incredible that all mention of suzerainty and the other matters in controversy have been passed over or ignored."

AS VIEWED IN PRETORIA.

A special dispatch from Pretoria says the British note, which was read in both Houses yesterday, is regarded there as a virtual ultimatum. The correspondent says: "It proposes a five years' franchise, a representation for the gold fields in the Volksraad equally for the Transvaal Government or the people for the old and new burghers in regard to presidential and other elections. If these conditions are accepted, a conference between representatives of the two governments will follow for the purpose of drafting the necessary measures, and of avoiding the introduction of unnecessary conditions by the Transvaal Government or the people. The possibility of the passage of any new bills calculated to defeat the reforms. In view of the fact, the note goes on to say, that the present state of affairs in Africa cannot be prolonged, the definite acceptance of this proposal is demanded without delay. Otherwise the Government will immediately take the whole situation under reconsideration, and will act as to bring about a settlement."

PEACEFUL SOLUTION PROBABLE.

Various official reports have been received from Pretoria predicting the Transvaal's acceptance of the terms of the latest dispatch, which is understood to furnish a basis for negotiations which will possibly lead to a peaceful settlement.

A special dispatch from Pietermaritzburg, Natal, says, President Kruger, it is asserted in reliable quarters, is prepared to attend the proposed conference at Cape Town, and probably will immediately accept the terms of Mr. Chamberlain's latest dispatch.

Great Britain. A peaceful solution, therefore, is probable.

RECEIVED SILENTLY.

The reading in the Volksraad of the reply of the British secretary of state for the colonies to the latest Transvaal note was greeted with silence, except for some interruptions from Mr. Tosen regarding the Transvaal question. Its terms, however, have produced much considerable excitement there. There is no indication yet of the view held regarding it. The foreign secretary, has gone to Bloemfontein on official business.

The burghers of Boxburg applied to the Transvaal Government for permission to remain in the event of war, but were refused on the ground that as Britons and other white men were not to be used as enemies, the burghers were being offered \$125 to remain on duty until ordered to leave.

It is said that Sir George Stewart White, V.C., has been selected to command the British forces in Natal. His division, it is expected, will number 15,000 men.

MR. TARTE'S OPINION.

Hon. J. Israel Tarte, Canadian minister of public works, in the course of an interview before sailing for home, referred to the Transvaal question, and declared the Boers' position ridiculous and impossible from a Canadian point of view.

Big Demonstration Billed for Saturday in Hyde Park.

London, Sept. 13.—The London solicitors of the French consulate have resigned as a protest against the verdict of the Dreyfus court-martial. The Paris correspondent of the Daily Chronicle claims to have good authority for the statement that Dreyfus will be pardoned, although President Loubet will not exercise his prerogative until after the meeting of the conseil de revision.

Under the head of "Pacification,"

the Paris Temps urges the government to take advantage of the present conditions and pardon Dreyfus, which, it adds, "would put the finishing touch to the Rennes verdict, and would permit France to occupy herself with the affairs of the country and the exhibition."

IN FAVOR OF A BOYCOTT.

Telegrams from the principal capitals report growing agitation in favor of a boycott of the Paris Exposition, but there is no indication of any official movement.

DEMONSTRATION IN HYDE PARK.

The home office has granted permission for the proposed demonstration in Hyde Park, London, next Saturday, to express sympathy for Dreyfus and to appeal to France to do him justice. Twenty-one platforms will be erected, and special requests are being made to the various churches and religious societies to assist in promoting the demonstration.

WILLIAM AND NICHOLAS.

The report that the czar is going to Potsdam in a few days as published in the Lokal Anzeiger, is without foundation. Emperor William will meet Emperor Nicholas, however, at a comparatively early date. It is probable that the czar and czarina will visit Princess Henry of Prussia at Kiel on their way to Darmstadt.

CEMETERY SWINDLER.

At Aberdeen, the trial of ex-President Coutts, of the Nellfield Cemetery, charged with disintering bodies, selling graves over again, and other illegal practices, was brought to a close. Lord McLaren, the justice presiding, advised the jury to accept a plea of guilty, made to some of the charges by the defendant. The jury accepted this suggestion, saying the publicity given the case would prevent a repetition of such practices. The prisoner was then sentenced to six months' imprisonment.

AUSTRALIAN FEDERATION.

The confederation scheme of the Australian colonies provides that an address to the Queen from three colonies, asking for power to form a confederation, shall be sufficient for its formation. As New South Wales, South Australia and Victoria have voted addresses on the subject, the imperial parliament, upon reassembling, will, it is presumed, take the matter up, whether the other colonies in the confederation are willing to its agreement or not. Queensland's final vote is not known. Tasmania's vote carried the federation. West Australia has not yet voted
