> IN FAVOR OF A BOYCOTT. Telegrams from the principal capitals report growing agitations in favor of a boycott of the Paris Exposition, but there is no indication of any official movement.

DEMONSTRATION IN HYDE PARK. The home office has granted permission for the proposed demonstration in Hyde Park, London, next Saturday, to express sympathy for Dreyfus and to appeal to France to do him justice. Twenty-one platforms will be erected, and special requests are being made to the various churches and religious societies to assist in promoting the demonstration.

WILLIAM AND NICHOLAS. The report that the czar is going to Potsdam in a few days as published in the Lokal Anzeiger, is without foundation. Emperor William will meet Emperor Nicholas, however, at a comparatively early date. It is probable that the czar and czarina will visit Princess Henry of Prussia at Kiel on their way to Darmstadt.

CEMETERY SWINDLER. At Aberdeen, the trial of ex-President Coutts, of the Nellfield Cemetery, charged with disinterring bodies, sell ing graves over again, and other illegal practices, was brought to a close. Lord McLaren, the justice presiding, advised the jury to accept a plea of guilty, made to some of the charges by the defendant. The jury accepted this suggestion, saying the publicity given to the case would prevent a repetition of such practices. The prisoner was then sentenced to six months' im-

prisonment. AUSTRALIAN FEDERATION. The confederation scheme of the Ausralian colonies provides that an adiress to the Queen from three colonies, asking for power to form a confedera-tion, shall be sufficient for its formation. As New South Wales, South Australia and Victoria have voted addresses on the subject, the imperial parliament, upon reassembling, will, it is presumed, take the matter up, whether the other countries in the confederation are willing to its agreement or not. Queensland's final vote is not known. Tasmania's vote carried the federation. West Australia has not yet voted. New Zealand has nothing to do with the federation question. If Queensland, Tasmania and Western Australia eventually decide for it, they will be taken it. It is thought they will favor it.
