DELIBERATE FALSIFICATION

Hugh John Macdonald Wilfully Misquotes Mr. Sifton-What the Minister Actually Said.

No more glaring instance of the absolutely audacious manner in which the Tories are endeavoring to mislead the electorate by deliberate misstatements has appeared in the last few days than occurs in a letter from Hugh John Macdonald to the president of the Brandon Conservative Association. Will it be believed that Hugh John actually cut off the quotation from Mr. Sifton's speech in the middle of sentence which concluded, "and his request was promptly declined." Such delaberate falsification of the records seems incredible in a public man, and especially in one who "always keeps his word." The following excerpt from Mr. Sifton's speech as it appeared in Hansard will demonstrate the willful character of the misrepresentation: "The story was circulated at the coast that I had given Mr. Philip a liquor permit, and that he had taken liquor into the Klondike, and with that charity which covers a multitude of sins the story was industriously circulated Ailsa Craig were followed by a large that I was his partner in connection with the taking of liquor into country.
