THE WEATHER.

TORONTO, Jan. 5—11 p. m.—The storm
center has moved from Lake Superior
southeastward across the lake region. The
pressure is now lowest off the middle
Atlantic coast and in Alberta, and highest
over Northern Canada and the Northwest
States. A fall of snow has occurred in
parts of Ontario to-day, but over the
greater part of the Dominion the weather
has been fair. It continues quite mild in
Alberta.

Four Girls Rescued by Firemen.

HAYESVILLE, Mass., Jan. 6.—There was
great excitement during a fire at O. S.
Currier's paper box factory, when four
girls were taken out in an insensible con-
dition by the firemen. One girl sprang from
a window and was badly cut and bruised.

Qu-powder and Matches.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Jan. 6.—Anton and
Henry Stone, aged seven and 18 months
respectively, found a fifteen-pound can of
gunpowder in the attic of their home.
They struck a lighted match to the
powder, wrecking the upper part of the
house, fatally burning the two children and
severely burning their mother and 18-year-
old brother.

Twelve Persons Rescued at Sea.

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—If the American
bark Herbert Fuller had not met with
rough weather and been driven into the
ice, it is more than likely that
Capt. Bunker, of the schooner Levanter,
his wife, son and crew of nine men would
have been lost at sea and nothing heard of
them or their vessel. The Herbert Fuller
has arrived at this port having the twelve
persons on board. The Levanter sailed
from Brunswick, Ga., when oil hateries
she was caught in a northeaster and she
sprang a leak. Seven feet of water filled
the hold, and the provisions of the crew
were spoiled. Only two quarts of drinking
water remained. For three days the twelve
people were at the mercy of the waves.
Signals of distress were seen by Capt.
Nash, of the Herbert Fuller, who rescued
them.

Amnesty for Mormons.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 6.—President
Harrison has issued a proclamation grant-
ing full amnesty and pardon under the act
of March 22, 1882, defining the crimes of
bigamy and polygamy in the territories of
the United States, known as the Anti-
Mormon Act, to all persons who have,
since Nov. 1, 1890, abstained from such un-
lawful practices, but upon the express con-
dition that they shall in the future faith-
fully obey the laws of the United States,
and not otherwise. Those who shall fail to
avail themselves of the clemency offered
will be vigorously prosecuted. The procla-
mation is based upon the action of the
Mormon Church of October, 1890, in pro-
claiming that it would no longer sanction
polygamous marriages; representation that
they have been alone, and the report of
the Utah commission recommending the

The Windup.

The Board of Works for 1892 met last
evening for the last time. There was very
little business to be transacted. The
engineer reported that the drain desired by
Christ Church would be laid if the peti-
tioners supplied the tile. Chas. Homister's
claim for damages was laid over. He broke
a finger by contact with a gaspipe on
Dundas street. The engineer will ascer-
tain whose pipe it was before the city
"pays the piper." The same official
will report on the statement that galleys
holes on Quebec street are under
the sidewalk. Moses Cox will be paid for
sawers laid minus the usual 5 per cent. for
six months. The week's pay sheet amounted
to \$152.38. During the year the committee
held 46 meetings, of which Ald. Shaw at-
tended 46, Barlett 41, Garratt 38, Jones
44, O'Meara 39, and Connor 35. Before
breaking up the committee voted their
hearty thanks to the genial chairman, Ald.
Connor, for his services during 1891, and
Ald. Connor thanked his colleagues for
their co-operation.

Amalgamation Ratified.

The London West Council met yester-
day and were given a certificate by Mr.
W. H. Bartram of the result of the poll on
the amalgamation bylaw. The council
thereupon passed the bylaw. The clerk
will notify the city council of the fact,
and, following the usual course, the city
solicitor will prepare a bill which will be
introduced at the next session of the
Ontario Legislature for adoption. The
amalgamation will take effect at a stated
time, and there will probably be an election
for aldermen.

The Final Meeting of No. 3.

The last meeting of No. 3 committee of
1892 was held last night in the council
chamber ante-room, with Ald. Fitzgerald
(chairman), Wm. Heaman, John Heaman,
Alonzo and Farrell, and Secretary Bell
present. License Inspector Henderson re-
ported that \$1,916 was the city's share of
the liquor license fees for 1892. Inspector
Bell reported that he had inspected the
bakeries of the city and found all the bread
of fit weight. During December the wood
market clerk collected \$15.50 in fees. The
chief of police will be asked to see that the
bylaw requiring the measurement of wood
is carried out at present it is said to be
laxly enforced. The electric light com-
panies will be requested to furnish a state-
ment showing the number and localities
of the poles owned by the city. The city
engineer will advertise in the
papers notifying contractors to submit
descriptions of proposed new buildings

invaluable assistance.

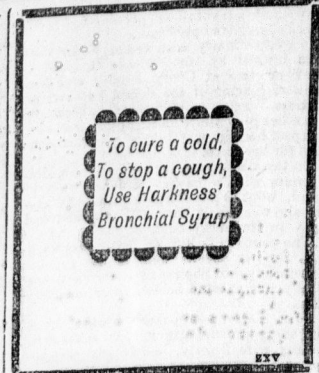

A CHAIN IN HIS STOMACH.

The Cause of the Death of a Big
Elephant Ascertained.BARABO, Wis., Jan. 6.—An autopsy
remarkable in itself and with surprising
results was held yesterday on the body of
the mammoth elephant Zip, that died a few
nights ago in winter quarters here. Prof.
Donaldson, of the Chicago University, and
Dr. Akely, of Milwaukee, performed the
autopsy, the purpose of which was to ascer-
tain the cause of the big pachyderm's
death. Although long of the most tractable
disposition, Zip three days preceding his
demise had been in a state of continuous
frenzy, tearing the kangaroos and other
animals at the quarters into spasms. An-
other peculiarity of the huge brute was a
sudden loss of appetite. Elephants are pro-
verbially long-lived, and the opportunity
for a scientist to dissect one comes so sel-
dom that Messrs. Donaldson and Akely
eagerly accepted this chance. The autopsy
was performed in one of the quarters,
specially curtained off to prevent the other
elephants from seeing what was going on.
A sharp knife was first drawn through the
tough skin under the stomach, the entire
length of the animal, and then the hide was
definitely removed. An incision was then made
in the stomach, and Prof. Donaldson, who
was wielding the scalpel, uttered an ex-
clamation of surprise. "There certainly
can be a bone in the elephant's stomach,"
he said, "and yet the knife strikes some-
thing apparently as hard as iron." The
next moment the cause of the professor's
astonishment was plain. As the ligaments
parted the spectators crowding around
could see links of a big chain. There was
no longer any doubt as to what had caused
the big elephant's death. Professors Donald-
son and Akely both declared it was a mar-
vel that the animal had lived so long with
so large a foreign substance in the stomach.
The action of the elephant in swallowing
the chain was also considered remarkable.
It was four feet long and weighed over 90
pounds. Zip tipped the scales at 80 tons
