ROADMASTER ROSE SAYS STRIKE'S DEAD

Claims That There is Perfect Harmony Along His Division

"I claim now that there is no strike on my division," Roadmaster Rose, of the C. P. R., said to The Advertiser this morning. "Along my line, which extends from Woodstock to Windsor, there are 24 sections and each one has a foreman and three men. In some places where it is always a difficult matter to get men, we have not this member, but in other places we have extra men. The work is being done in perfect harmony."

In reply to an inquiry, he said nearly all the old men have gone back, and others have been employed in places of the few who are still out. Of course, at this time of the year a man can't get work and that made it a little difficult to supply all the places, but the division is now fully manned. In fact, what strike there was in the London division has dwindled out."

PASSING OF THE DARK STRAW HAT.

A New York paper says fewer brown straw hats are worn there than in almost any other city, and adds: "Absence of soft coal smoke is one suggested explanation of the prevalence of white straw. But New York people need not plume themselves on the supposition that they are the only ones who have ceased to wear the old-fashioned brown and black and spotted straw hats. Those hats have almost been forgotten, save in such cities as St. Louis and Cincinnati and a few small towns in Arkansas, where they are still worn by people who chew tobacco and expectorate in the streets."

Here in Chicago, for instance, a brown or black straw hat would be as much of a curiosity as a blue swallow-tail coat of the vintage of '52, notwithstanding that contempt in which the smoke inspector is held by most of our tug captains. We cannot, therefore, accept the theory that white straw hats owe their vogue to an absence of the smoke nuisance.—Chicago Record-Herald.
