FAMOUS MUNCEY INDIAN SCHOOL

Magnificent Work That Is Being Done There—Indians in Attendance From Nearly Twenty Tribes—Its Far-Reaching Influence.

About two miles from the village of Muncie, and nine miles by a pleasant drive from Mount Brydges, the Thames takes one of its cranks, turning, enclosing on one side some low, rich pasture lands, while on the other it is banked by a cliff that rises sharp and high to be surmounted by a splendid-looking pile of buildings, the Mount Elgin Industrial Institution, better known as the Muncie Indian Institute. A day or so ago an Advertiser representative had the pleasure of visiting the school, and his surprise at its size and the character of the work done there was such that he deemed it not unwise to let more be known of it, because there can be little doubt that the people throughout this western district, have very little knowledge of the extent to which this school has influenced and is at present influencing a large portion of the great body of Canadian Indians. Pittsburg, Nov. 1.—A Lake Shore and Michigan Southern locomotive, leased by the Pittsburg and Lake Erie road, blew up tonight, near Shanopin station, killing Harry Walters, of Sheridan, Pa., and severely injuring three others.

DROPPED DEAD.

Toronto, Nov. 1.—James Fitzgerald, 245 Bathurst street, until some years ago a merchant of Millbrook, while out for a walk this evening fell dead in the street. Death resulted from paralysis.

SWEPT OVERBOARD.

Montreal, Nov. 1.—A. F. Laurie, son of William Laurie, government steamboat inspector, of this city, who was third engineer on board the steamer Milwaukee, bound from New Orleans to Cape Town, has been lost at sea. He was swept overboard the first night out.

DIED FROM LOCKJAW.

St. Louis, Nov. 1.—The list of deaths attributed to lockjaw as a result of the administration of diphtheria antitoxine manufactured by the city chemist, now numbers eleven, two more deaths being reported today. Eleven other children are reported to the health department as suffering from lockjaw, with a slight chance for recovery in each case, said to be poisoning from the city's diphtheria antitoxine.

Reading, Pa., Nov. 1.—At noon today the bodies of Walter Snyder and Minnie Reichstetter were found on Mount Penn, with bullet holes through their temples. A pistol was lying by Snyder's side, and it is supposed he killed the girl and then committed suicide.
