CZARINA'S CLOSE CALL

Nearly Mixed Up in the Bloody Riot

That Occurred on Sunday Last in St. Petersburg.

Deficit of \$135,000,000 Anticipated for Britain's Next Fiscal Year-Loan of \$100,000,000 May Be Floated-The Remount Scandal.

St. Petersburg, March 19.-The narinjury or probable death, the killing of half a dozen persons, the serious wounding of others and 500 arrests. constitute the belated report which the censor permits to be sent out of Sunday's big students' demonstration in front of the Cathedral of Our Lady of Kazan, as was at first contemplated, the disorders occurred throughout

the day IN ALL PARTS OF THE CITY. Unconscious of this, the czarina and WILL TRY TO INTERCEPT MARother members of the imperial household took no special precautions to protect their equipages on their daily outings. As a result the carriages containing royal personages and the nobility were mixed up several times in the melees. One carriage was upset by the rioters and the occupants saved from the mob's violence by the police. Four men were killed outright, and hundreds fell seriously wounded. The czarina passed the place of blood-
