

Candidates of the Liberal Party in Western Ridings

members on both sides of the House to be one of the most thoroughly posted men on all public matters, particu-

larly those relating to municipal affairs. He is very painstaking in his duties, and a good debater and is invariably heard on all questions of importance. Mr. Auld is a publisher, being the editor and proprietor of the Amherstburg Echo. He was born at Warwick, Lambton county, on June 22, 1853, and is consequently in his 52nd year. He is married and has a family of four children. He was educated at the public school, and the old Strathroy Grammar School. In 1877 he married Anna Hamilton, the youngest daughter of the late James Hamilton, who was connected with the customs department at Amherstburg. Mr. Auld has from the day he took up his residence in Amherstburg, shown a deep interest in the town's affairs. He was a trustee of the public schools for eight years; served as town councillor in 1884; and during the next two years was honored by election to the reeve ship. In 1890, when a member of the Essex county council, Mr. Auld was elected warden. In all of these public positions he showed exceptional ability, and it was not to be wondered at, when in 1896, on the death of Hon. W. D. Balfour, he was chosen as the Liberal candidate for South Essex. Mr. Auld was successful in the contest. In 1898, at the general election, he was again returned, and in 1902 he once more carried the riding for the cause of good government. The Liberals of South Essex are united and there is no doubt that Mr. Auld will be elected by a big majority on Wednesday next.

EXISTENCE OF THE MONTREAL BASEBALL FRANCHISE IN DOUBT

Montreal, Jan. 19.—When the Eastern League baseball magnates meet in New York city next Monday there will be several important matters considered, both as to the make-up of the league for next year, the drafting proposition, and other things, which may cause quite a sensation in the minor leagues. P. T. Powers will likely figure conspicuously in this assembly.

The greatest interest will be attached to the action of the Montreal Club, as to whether the team will remain here or move to Richmond, Va. It is up to John Kreitner, the millionaire baseball magnate and theatrical man, to determine this.

Richmond, Va., wants the franchise, and wants it badly. Kreitner is on the fence. He likes Montreal. The people like him, because during the last season he had one of the best teams in the league, and paid fancy prices for the players.

The team was so good that Cleveland, Pittsburgh and other clubs drafted several of the players. Notwithstanding this fact, most of the team remains intact, and it will not be surprising if some of the old players who have been drafted are returned, so that there will be little change in the make-up.

In talking to a Montreal friend, Mr. Kreitner is reported to have said he favored a short season, say perhaps 120 games, and that he favored playing managers and intends to get one himself for the team which was here last season, whether or not his organization of baseball players is probable. He also hinted that he thought Richmond, Va., would be a better place than Montreal for a baseball team, in-

dicating, perhaps, that he might remove his team to that city. "Of course," he said, "nothing will be done until the meeting in New York on Monday. I look for several important developments there, but I am unable to state just what they will be. The Montreal affairs will be considered among other things, and an effort will be made to keep William Clancy, our first baseman. Clancy has been drafted by Pittsburgh. It is not fair, because he cost me \$15,000 when I got him from the Worcester, Mass., Club, and the Pittsburgh Club gets him from me for \$750. That's a big proposition, isn't it? If we can draft Clancy, I will be the manager next season. I have always favored a playing manager. You see how successful Collins Griffith and McGraw have been while acting in that capacity. I think that a playing manager can turn out a better team than a man who is only on the bench."

In case Pittsburgh insists on having Clancy, Mr. Kreitner insisted that he have Andrew vs. James Burnett, first baseman, who will act as playing manager.

Speaking of the coming season, the millionaire thrust his hands into his pockets, pulled hard on his cigar, and remarked: "I shall insist upon starting the season about May 14 and ending about Sept. 15. That is an ideal season for the fans and the players."

Mr. Kreitner expects to land Shortstop James, who is really under contract with him, but who has been playing independent ball in Ohio. There will be few other changes on the club, and it is probable that he is only a guess as to whether the team will remain here or move to Richmond, Va.

HOCKEY PLAYER WAS LENIENTLY DEALT WITH BY THE MAGISTRATE

Was Fined Only \$1 for Assaulting Opponent—Klondikers and Kingston.

Brookville, Jan. 19.—G. VanHorne, the Kingston hockeyist, whose arrest for assault during a hockey game here Monday last created such a furore in sporting circles, appeared in the police court here Wednesday. The matter was finally settled by the imposition of a nominal fine of \$1 and payment of costs of \$5. VanHorne left for home at noon. The arrest was made at the instigation of the police here, and Paul Hayward, the Brookville player who received the knockout blow on the head, declined to have anything to do with the prosecution of VanHorne, and stated that he was not sure of the identity of the party who struck him. VanHorne denied having been conscious of striking Hay-

ward, but in order to facilitate matters entered a plea of guilty.

LIBERALS OF NORTH MIDDLESEX ARE UNITED IN THIS CAMPAIGN

Working for the Election of Mr. W. H. Taylor—Mr. Hodgins' Circular.

The Liberal campaign in West Middlesex is being prosecuted with a vigor which is sure to be crowned with success on Wednesday next. The workers in every section of the riding are united in the interests of Mr. W. H. Taylor, who has represented the riding with satisfaction for several terms, and they have handed in the most gratifying reports. Mr. Taylor has been from one end of the riding to the other, and like his supporters, he is pleased with the outlook.

Lobo, East Williams, West Williams, Adelaide and Alisa Craig, will each do better, it is said, in 1902, when they rolled up a handsome majority for the Reform candidate.

The Conservative strongholds of Hiddulph and Lucan are expected to give a majority considerably smaller than in 1898, and there is every indication that they will do better for Mr. Taylor than they did in 1902.

While Mr. Taylor's township, McGillivray, which has a majority (Conservative), of 76 to 90, will be about equally divided, indicating a point to a slight majority for the Liberal candidate in the town of Parkhill, where Mr. Hodgins, the Conservative candidate, is making his headquarters, and from which place the Tory machine is being worked.

The attention of the Liberals has been attracted by the large number of strangers who have put in an appearance in the riding during the last two or three days, and the result is that the voters will be closely watched.

The Conservatives are attempting to make capital against Mr. Taylor by charging him with being the father of the county council's bill of 1896—that which is now in force—whereas that measure was introduced by the late Hon. A. S. Hardy before he was Premier of the Province and was not introduced by Mr. Taylor.

Mr. Taylor, however, did introduce a bill in 1903, and it became law, to allow counties to change the composition of their councils from the present form to include the mayors and reeves of the different municipalities. He has also introduced a great deal of other

legislation and has made himself one of the most useful members of the House. In 1904 he introduced a bill to prevent accidents from shooting in the hunting season. It was introduced an amendment to the lines fence act, an amendment to the ditches and watercourses act, and an amendment to the Ousebeck act, by which clerks of local municipalities are only required to send a copy of the assessment roll once every three years instead of annually to the county clerk. During the last Parliament he was chairman of one of the committees.

Mr. Hodgins' Circular.

The latest scheme of the Conservative candidate is to issue a circular to electors, withholding it, however, until after Wednesday, in order that it could not be handled at the nomination meeting. Accompanying the circular is a copy of Dr. Hoesbeck's letter. To show the exaggerated nature of the statements made by Mr. Hodgins, it is only necessary to quote the following clause:

"Thousands of officials formerly appointed by the municipalities are now appointed by the Government, a change made for no other purpose than to strengthen the Government.
