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WAS SENECA DEAD WHEN RUN OVER?

Stratford C. runner and Police Endeavoring to Fathom Murder Mystery.

Stratford, Ont., Aug. 24.—Coroner J. P. Rankin was promptly on the scene of the tragedy, and together with the police, is gathering together the connecting links. He stated that from his hurried examination of the bodies of the dead men, he found right side of Gamble's head battered to jelly. The wounds seemed to be of a nature inflicted by a number of blows from a heavy stick. The Indian's head was severely contused, one just at the knee and the other just above. These were taken off by the engine of the freight, passing over them. He also had his skull fractured on the top, and at the sides. These are sufficient to have caused death, and the theory is that they were inflicted while he lay on the ground, and the body was carried along the track by the engine, although several of the crew of the train state that the body was quite cold when picked up. The coroner stated that whether or not these injuries to the head were sustained before death may be ascertained at the post-mortem, which will be held this afternoon.

The late John Gamble was a man between 20 and 30 years of age, and formerly lived on John street with his wife and family, but for some time past has been working on the farm on which the tragedy occurred. Previous to that he was employed at various occupations about the city. He had lived here for a number of years. Besides his wife, he is survived by two grown-up sons and three younger children.

Indian of Quiet Character.

Adrian Senece, the dead Indian, was a powerful-looking chap of 22 years. He had been in this vicinity about a week, with a dozen other Indians, pulling stax. The band came from Munceytown, on the reservation, and in it are included the dead man's father, mother, brothers, sisters and uncles. Senece was a peaceful disposition, and was working with the other Indians as usual the day previous. The members of the band viewed the tragedy with the morning, and positively identified the dead man, but exhibited the stoicism of their race in regard to the tragedy.

Engineer McGowan, who brought in engine 604, which struck the Indian, Senece, told a story which adds some complications to the case. He says that when the Indian was picked up, immediately after the train struck him, the body was quite cold, seeming to point to the fact that the man had been dead some hours. This is a very serious supposition, that the Indian was severely wounded in the melee and lay on the track while trying to make his way to the engine. The investigation may bring further developments.

Chief Detective Day, of the Grand Trunk, who was early on the scene, and is taking particular interest in the case, also inclines to the idea that the man was dead before the engine struck him. Another police officer, ever, seems to disprove this. The Indian was shoved some distance by the train, and he was lying on his back where he was picked up. If he had been wounded before this he would probably have lost considerable blood where he had been lying for some time.

A coroner's jury was empaneled, and together with the coroner, Rankin and Crown Attorney McPherson viewed the remains and the scene of the tragedy this afternoon. An adjournment was taken until tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock. The jury comprises: Messrs. Jas. Pringle, J. W. (foreman), James O'Hara, P. Whyte, Wm. Daly, Geo. T. Jones, D. H. Far-rough, John Byers, James Baker, John Morris, Wm. Welsh, J. H. Dunsmore, Wm. Dunsmore, Geo. Sykes, jun., and John Grady.
