CANNOT PLACATE
GERMAN WAR LORD

The Kaiser's Organs Assume a Menacing Tone Toward France Over Morocco.

London, Feb. 14.—In spite of all the optimism in regard to the outcome of the Algeiras conference, there is much reason to fear that it will adjourn without a settlement of the only real question for which it has assembled. The Germans are a peace-loving people, and cannot therefore view with any but feelings of repugnance a war upon so miserable a pretext as that of Morocco.

There is no mistaking the imperious and unyielding one of the Government towards the French of feder. Nothing that the French have done to placate the war lord of Germany has met with any success. To appease him Minister Delcasse was compelled to resign because he had committed the diplomatic informality of neglecting to notify the Government at Berlin of the treaty with England.

Yet no umbrage was taken toward the British cabinet, which under the same treaty finally proclaimed exclusive British supremacy over Egypt.

There is no question of the "open door" to Morocco at the Algeiras conference. Upon that point the declarations of France are entirely satisfactory to England, Italy, Spain, and, in fact, every European Government except Germany.

The German Government alone insists as an ultimatum that France, with her predominant political interests in Northern Africa, shall not exert an exclusive policy influence in Morocco.

Should the Algeiras conference dissolve without a settlement of this important point the German Government has expressly declared that the failure shall not have war for its consequence. But this question, if left open, will be a perpetual menace to the world's peace.

The French Government will proceed to act toward Morocco in accordance with the Anglo-French treaty of 1904, and in this will have at least the moral support of its co-signatory. Should Germany then declare that it cannot yield its present ground as to the French policy influence over Morocco, who can predict what conflicts may not rise over so strained a situation?
