of Christ—Lessons From

Late Disasters.

happiness in this world. Men, he said,

would not believe certain things unless

they had experienced them themselves,

and many would still doubt if God stood

before them sheeted in flame, or even

if one were to rise from the dead. He

referred to the wonderful work which

had been done by missionaries in far

disant heathen lands. In many cases

devoted Christian men had ventured, un-

protected, among man-eating savages

where no man had ever before dared
