THAT AFRICAN TRIP
No One to Accompany President Ex-
cept Kermit and Two Taxidermists.

Washington, Oct. 2.—The "army of
rough riders, trappers and men who
"catch 'em alive with their hands,"
who have been looking forward to the
President's African trip in quest of
big game as an occasion in which
they would play a part will be disap-
pointed. The President has no inten-
tion of having anybody accompany
him on the trip except his son Kermit.
Two taxidermists from the National
Museum will be along, but they will
not be invited directly. The National
Museum will be asked to detail them
from the official staff. The President
has already notified the officers of the
museum that he will send back such
of the specimens as the museum may
want to preserve.

No definite itinerary has yet been
arranged. The President will go
where he can find the game, and if he
falls to find it one place he will go
to another, and when he has found it
he will camp there. The details of
the trip will not be made, therefore,
until after he has consulted his guides,
who will not be from the United States.
The caravan will be mustered in after
Mr. Roosevelt reaches the African
coast.

Reports that the President has ac-
cepted an invitation from this or that
official or dignitary are also prema-
ture. The President has received no
invitations and his plans at present
will hardly admit of his accepting
any. A story cabled from abroad that
the Sultan of Zanzibar was planning
to entertain the President is classed
as romance today. It is not likely,
it is said, that the President would be
within a thousand miles of Zanzibar.

**Sir Wilfrid at the Ancient Capital
Was Greeted by Fifty Thousand**

**Premier Recipient of an Ovation
That Breaks All Records.**

Quebec, Oct. 5.—The largest demon-
stration ever witnessed in the ancient
capital crowded the streets today to
do honor to the Liberal chief, Sir
Wilfrid Laurier. Fully fifty thousand
people lined the streets to witness the
procession of citizens on foot and in
carriages, with bands of music, that
escorted the Premier from the Cha-
teau Frontenac through the principal
streets of the Upper Town, St. Roches
and St. Sauveur to the Variety Hall,
Notre-Dame street, where Sir
Wilfrid addressed a monster meeting
on the political issues of the present
electoral campaign. One-half the popu-
lation of the Upper Town turned out
to welcome and cheer the chief, but
the ovation accorded him in his own
constituency of Quebec East, com-
prising the suburbs of St. Roches and
St. Sauveur, beggars description. The
streets were simply a mass of human-
ity, who were intensely enthusias-
tic in their demonstration of welcome.
An Ovation From 7,000.

There were fully 7,000 people crowded
into the spacious hall in which the
meeting was held, and so densely
packed was it that it was with diffi-
culty Sir Wilfrid, the Postmaster-
General and his friends could make
their way through the dense mass to
the stage, which was also thronged
with people. The entrance of Sir Wil-
frid to the spacious hall, the largest
in Quebec, was the signal for a de-
monstration never heretofore witnessed
in this Province, and when he gained
the stage the ovation accorded him
beyond mere pen-and-ink description.
Among those who occupied seats on
the stage were Hon. R. Lemieux, Sir
Lomer Gouin, Hon. L. A. Taschereau,
Hon. J. C. Kane, Messrs. A. Lachance,
Wm. Power, Fortin, Naud, M. P. P.
Dr. Cote, M. P. P., J. B. Laliberte
(president of the Quebec harbor com-
mission), and Dr. McKay, nominated
today as Liberal candidate to contest
Quebec County.

Dr. Gosselin acted as Chairman. Mr.
Lefebvre, M. P. P. for St. Roches,
and Dr. Cote, M. P. P. for St. Sauveur,
first addressed the meeting and pre-
dicted certain victory for the Liberal
party at the close of the polls on the
basis of the strength of the demon-
stration. Sir Wilfrid then launched
out into a powerful argument on the
