Canada West.
Of the May monthlies there is none more attractive as to appearance, more readable as to matter, than is Canada West, the bright, breezy magazine that has so rapidly won a high place in the estimation of Canadian readers. From its virile cover—its which has caught something of the vigor and fine red blood of the great prairie land—to back page the number is crammed with interesting story, picture and poem. Emerson Hough, Arthur Stringer, Cy Warman, Sam Kiser—a list to conjure with—are all represented. Hough continues his series of striking articles on the Dominion's greatest problem—immigration. The series is a remarkable one, touching on a most vital question, and consists of the observations of a trained writer and deep thinker.
Then there is Arthur Stringer, the brilliant young novelist and poet, who in "Mr. Optic" gives a vivid picture of Calgary (the "Denver of the Northwest") and the unbounded faith of the Calgaryans in their beautiful and progressive city.

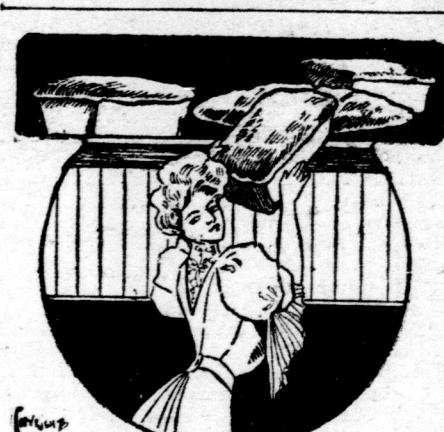

Mr. Justice Fetzels has granted an order winding up the Grimby Park Company, Limited. The petitioner is the Bank of Hamilton, owner of \$15,000 debentures, on which the company was indebted for interest from September 1, 1905, making \$1,230; also of \$1,000 capital stock. The capital stock of the company consisted of \$15,000 common and \$30,000 preferred, and \$40,000 debenture, at 4 per cent, secured by first mortgage on the assets of the company. The Mercantile Trust Company, Limited, of Canada, Limited, of Hamilton, is appointed liquidator, with reference to the local master at Hamilton.

SUNDAY SERVICES WELL ATTENDED

Big Congregations Filled Nearly Every Edifice in the City

MAITLAND ST. BAPTISTS

This Thriving Congregation Celebrated Their Anniversary—Sermons From Many Pulpits.

The services in London churches were unusually well attended Sunday, particularly those held in the morning. The fine weather, which followed a series of wet Sundays, also had something to do with bringing the people out.

Special springtime services were held in a number of the Anglican churches of the city yesterday. These were the special Rogation Day services, and were held in the churches of W. order issued by the bishops throughout Canada that such services be held either on that day, or one of the three days preceding Ascension Day, which is on Thursday next. Special prayers were said for blessing on the seedtime, and petitions were made for an abundant harvest. It is an old custom in the Anglican churches, but it is the first time that it has been conducted in Canada on the order of the bishops.

"The Value of Opposition and the Theme of Popular Applause" was the theme of Rev. J. Gibson Inkster's services yesterday. In the evening his theme, "The Measure of Responsibility," was based on the text, Matthew, 11, 22-24. The responsibility to which God holds man was clearly presented in the words of the text, and the fact that we accepted God's standard was proved by our judgment of others. Then the responsibility for the light, which man already have was emphasized. What men need is not more light, but strength of character, to live up to the light they possess. Conscience of conviction in the inner life added to responsibility and the examples of Christian living ever before men also increased the weight of their responsibility. In the face of all this man's only way was to do as Christ said: "Repent and turn to me."

CITY ARCHITECT IS NOT A BIT WORRIED
Over the Charges That Have Been Made Against the New Fire Halls.

Another tempest in a teapot has apparently been started by Mr. Joseph Lawrence, of the Real Estate Owners' Association, in regard to the new fire halls. He charges that the halls are built too low, and that in some cases there is too much mortar. Architect Nutter says the building are all right.

From what can be learned there is little or nothing wrong with the fire halls. True the south end hall is low, but that will be overcome when the lawn around it is levelled up. Fire halls are built close to the level all over the world in order that there will be no grade when the horses leave the halls.

When an alarm is given there would be grave danger if there was a steep grade, or a grade of any kind. When the lawn is levelled up, there will be no fault to be found with it. The north end hall is low, and when it is filled up to the proper height it will be all right.

Chief's Position.
Chief Aitken had nothing to say regarding the halls when he was seen this morning.

"The halls were practically completed when I was made chief," said Chief Aitken. "The plans were made by Mr. Nutter, and were considered by the late chief and the chairman of No. 3 committee. All I had to do was look after the equipment."

"So far as I can see, there are few cells that have no water in this season. The South End hall looks squatly at the present time, but it will be remedied when the ground is levelled up. My opinion was that it might have been raised a foot. However, others have another opinion, and they have a right to it."

"As for the workmanship, I have nothing whatever to say. That is for the architect and the chairman of the committee. The Real Estate Owners are going to look them over this afternoon."

No Difficulty.
From what can be learned, there will be no difficulty over the matter as no person takes the charges seriously.

"I have nothing to say," said Architect Nutter. "Let some of these gentlemen make charges properly, and I will see what will come of it. Some people are trying to stir up trouble, and they seize on anything. Let them come on. There are a good many buildings that these in this city, you can say."

Council To Blame.
It should be pointed out that the city council of last year purchased the lot for the north end hall contrary to the advice of the late chief and the other city officials.

It was pointed out at the time that the lot was low, and liable to cause trouble. If any blame was to be attached to any person in connection with the lot, the council of 1908 must bear it.

After stalling to the evidence Judge Elliott decided to let the accused go, but warned him in discharging him that he had had a very close call.

JUDGMENT RESERVED IN THE FEWINGS CASE

Appeal of the Defendant Was Heard at Toronto on Friday.

The court of appeal at Toronto heard argument and reserved judgment of defendants' appeal in the action of Miss Edith Fewings, of St. Thomas, claiming damages against the Grand Trunk Railway for injuries received on March 10, 1908, while crossing the tracks on Richmond street. The action came before Judge Justice Meredith on January 11 and 12, 1909, and the jury, having answered certain questions submitted to them by the court, and having assessed the damages at \$1,500, the trial judge subsequently, on January 19, directed that judgment should be entered in favor of plaintiff for that amount. From this judgment the defendants appealed directly.

BUILDING IS MOVING BRISKLY IN LONDON
Engineer Graydon Continues to Hand Out Permits in Large Numbers.

There is still a good demand for building permits, the following being issued by City Engineer Graydon this morning: J. McFadden, cement foundation and his residence on Colborne street, to cost \$50; Chas. H. Brown, to raise a two story veneer residence on Regina street, to cost \$700; Henry E. Harwood, to put a basement under his house on Ridout street, to cost \$250; John Stevenson, for the erection of two story and a quarter brick house on William street, to cost \$1,000 each; to Daniel Steele, for story and a half brick veneer house on Glebe street, \$1,500; J. E. Hodgins, verandah to house on Colborne street, \$100; J. Talbot, verandah on house on Florence street, \$100; Henry Christopher, verandah on house on Piccadilly street, to cost \$300; and a permit to raise house and build an addition on Ann street, to cost \$800.

MCGREGOR WATER GOES TO TWO ANALYSTS
Samples Were Furnished Both the Provincial and Dominion Laboratories.

The board of health has not yet received the request of the water commissioners that they report on the artesian well scheme, but when they do, it is likely that it would be acted upon as soon as it came to his hands. He expressed his opinion that artesian wells were a proper source of supply for the city.

Use It Right Away.
"If the water is pure, there is no reason why it could not be used," said Dr. Niven. "We will look into the matter right away. Personally I am in favor of artesian wells, and if they have not touched the rock the water should be all right."

"I have not received any report as to the water in the McGregor well. The analyses made some years ago were not as favorable, and the water was not used. We sent samples to both the provincial and Dominion analysts, and we should have a report here in a short time."
