EXPLORER AND EDITOR REMEMBERED BY KING

Shackleton and Robertson Nicoll Made Knights—Canadians Honored.

London, Nov. 8.—Three Canadians are included in the list of birthday honors issued tonight. They are: W. W. Cory, Canadian deputy minister of the interior; Col. Seely, connected with the British Columbia office, and A. B. Perry. Mr. Cory and Mr. Perry are made Commanders of the Order of Michael and George—C.M.G.—and Mr. Seely is made a privy councillor. No peerages are conferred, being the third time one have been granted.

The list comprises six privy councillors, six baronets and a host of knights. Except in the case of Lieut. E. H. Shackleton, the explorer, the rewards are for the most part for philanthropic and political service, in addition to the customary Bath, colonial and Indian honors.

Dr. William Robertson Nicoll, editor of the British Weekly and other publications, is among those knighted.

Sven Hedin, the Swedish geographer and explorer, who recently led an expedition through Tibet, has been knighted Commander of the Indian Empire.

Admiral Sir Edward H. Seymour, who commanded the British squadron which participated in the Hudson-Fulton celebration this fall, and Sir Edward Speyer, the banker, are made privy councillors.

Lieut. E. H. Shackleton, who penetrated nearest to the South Pole, was made a knight.

ROWDY STUDENTS HEAVILY PUNISHED

Three Toronto Varsity "Smart Alecks" Expelled for Session.

Toronto, Nov. 8.—According to the decision of the university caput handed out this afternoon, the evidence against the five students for taking part in the fracas on Hal-lowe'en is not sufficient to warrant their expulsion from the university, but it was enough to cause serious penalties to be imposed.

Three of them will be expelled for the rest of the academic year, another has been fined \$50, and the fifth will have to pay the damages done to the roller belonging to the Toronto Cricket Club.

The caput decided the five before them were not ring leaders, though they took considerable part in the doings.

NORTH ESSEX CAMPAIGN QUIETEST ON RECORD

Both Liberal and Conservative Candidates Are Claiming Victory.

Windsor, Nov. 9.—Residents in North Essex declare that the contest for the seat in the House of Commons vacated by the promotion of R. F. Sutherland, is the quietest they have ever known.

In the last election, Mr. Sutherland was returned by a majority of 551. That lead was made up of majorities in every polling district with the exception of Walkerville, which has always been a part of the Conservative district.

Both candidates are confident of victory.

The shortness of time prevents the holding of many meetings. In the interests of Wilcox three public gatherings have been held, while two more have been scheduled for the evening of tonight.

The Conservative workers seem to be relying on the result of a "still" hunt now in progress, and on the appeal that their candidate is a farmer.

One of the most important factors in the campaign is the appearance of Hon. Mackenzie King, who will be present at a big Liberal gathering in Windsor this afternoon.

Last night the tentation of the Conservative element was directed to Walkerville. In the I. O. O. F. Hall Wilcox addressed a good-sized gathering.

McKee entertained a large gathering in Windsor.

BORDEN CLAIMS ALL THE CREDIT

Tells Strathroy Meeting All Good Things Came From Conservatives.

SUPPORTS "FARMER" CRY But Neely, M. P., Tells Electors of West Middlesex, To Take No Notice of It.

[By a Staff Reporter.]

Strathroy, Nov. 8.—The Lyceum was filled to capacity this evening to hear Mr. R. L. Borden, leader of the Conservative party, discuss the issues of the West Middlesex campaign.

The electors gave Mr. Borden, on this his first appearance in West Middlesex since he became leader of the party, a very hearty welcome, and listened to him with attention from beginning to end.

Contrary to expectations, Mr. Borden did not touch upon any live topics of the day. He contented himself with dealing generally with the policy of the Liberal party, and declared that the Government had been guilty of maladministration since taking the reins of power. He reiterated in brief the Halifax platform.

Mr. Borden claimed that any policies of advancement adopted by the Laurier Administration during the past two or three years particularly had emanated from the Opposition. He also followed the cue given him by the party organizer, and made a special plea for a farmer to represent the riding.

The first part of the speech was identical with that delivered before the Canadian Club in London.

Where Was the Candidate?

One feature of the evening's programme was the unexpected absence of Mr. Robert McLaughlin, the Conservative leader. It was fully expected that he would be present, but at the last minute a telegram was received from him, stating that it would be impossible for him to be present. His absence caused not a little discussion.

The crowd came from considerable distances to hear Mr. Borden, some coming from East Lambton, the neighboring riding, and a number from North Middlesex.

Mr. J. Tohill, of Napier, president of the West Middlesex Liberal Conservative Association, presided.

On the platform with him were Major Beattie, M. P., London; George Neely, M. P., East Middlesex; Joseph E. Armstrong, M. P., East Lambton; John Farrell, Forest; John Kerr, Petrolia; R. E. Lesueur, Sarnia; Mayor Dingman, Stratford; Dr. R. Gibson, Watford; president of the East Lambton Conservative Association; Mayor Harry C. Ford, Strathroy, and others.

Mr. Tohill, the chairman, welcomed Mr. Borden to West Middlesex in a brief speech, and Mr. George Neely was introduced. He criticised the automobile legislation proposed in the Legislature by Duncan C. Ross, and declared that such legislation was not only unwise, but impossible of enforcement. He charged Mr. Ross with deliberately bringing forward this question in order to mislead the innocent farmers. Mr. Neely was out of touch with his leader, in that he told the audience not to take seriously the cry of farmer against lawyer. He considered, however, that a farmer, who was not practiced in the art of expression should be given just as much opportunity in the House as a man who could do so.

Hume Elliott, of London, followed in a witty speech, in which he asked the good friends of Duncan C. Ross to
