## CHINESE TROOPS AT TIBETAN CAPITAL

Serious Strife Has Broken Out on Northeastern Frontier of India.

Calcutta, Feb. 18.—The recent reports of trouble between the Chinese and Tibetans are confirmed by dispatches received by the Pioneer, a newspaper of Allahabad, stating that Lhasa, the capital of Tibet, has been occupied by 2,000 Chinese troops, supposedly for the purpose of abolishing the Tibetan council and establishing a purely Chinese government in Tibet. The Lhasa see their power vanishing, and have no means to preserve it. The Tibetans complain that Chinese troops have desecrated their holy places and monasteries, and levied contributions on the people. The situation is watched with some anxiety in India. The desirability of strengthening the troops on the northeastern frontier is discussed.

## MIDDLESEX WOMEN WANT TO VOTE

Obviously the women in the country districts decidedly favor the suffrage movement. At a largely attended meeting of the Sylvan Women's Institute, on Wednesday, the members voted overwhelmingly in favor of Mr. Studholme's bill. A resolution was passed, to be forwarded to Mr. James Doyle, M. P. for North Middlesex, asking him to support the bill and present the request to the Prime Minister of Ontario.

## COUNTY COUNCIL READS RIOT ACT TO CITY

Will Only Be Responsible for Such Patients as Are Admitted to Hospital by a Proper Certificate.

There was a brief session of the hospital trust in the mayor's office yesterday afternoon with the chairman, Mr. J. C. Judd, in the chair.

A communication was read from the county council, stating that "The hospital council will in future deny any liability for county patients admitted to Victoria Hospital without the certificate of the reeve or deputy reeve, in which event the hospital trustees shall be notified within 24 hours."

The communication was filed.

It was urged, however, that the matter should be brought to the attention of country doctors, as it was practically impossible to refuse a patient that claimed admission to the hospital, and it became more than ever necessary to have the patient properly certified to.

## A Donation.

A donation of \$50 from Mr. Hiram Walker, of Walkerville, was received, and Mr. Secrest moved that it be accepted to go to the special purposes fund, and that the thanks of the trust be extended to the donor.

The superintendent's report for the month of January showed: Number of patients admitted: Males 73, females 37; children 35; total, 105. Number of patients discharged: Males 58, females 63; children 40; total, 161. Number of births, 7; number of deaths, 2; operations, 66. Number of patients receiving treatment Jan. 31, 1910, 130. Total receipts for the month, \$2,145.

Accounts totalling \$7,440 40 were then passed.

Superintendent Heard stated that yesterday there were 170 patients in the hospital, of whom 20 were scarlet fever patients and 15 diphtheria.

## CHIEF ENGINEER IS WHAT IS WANTED

Members of Board of Works Asked to Have Wording of Minutes Changed.

There may be a storm over an effort that is being made to change the minutes of the board of works.

At the meeting of the board last night, a motion was passed that the council be recommended to employ a consulting engineer for the city.

No objection was made to it at the time, but this morning Ald. Tancock, the chairman, and Ald. Morgan, at the city hall, and a request was made to the secretary to so change the minutes that the motion would read that a chief, or head, engineer, was what should be employed.

There is no doubt that the motion as amended would have passed the committee, but some of the aldermen decidedly object to motions being amended outside the committee-rooms or when the other members are not present.

Some of the aldermen are going to say something right out loud about the practice, it is said.

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## STOCKING DYE CAUSED POISON

A case at Kingston shows vividly the danger of neglecting to apply Zam-Buk to a cut or a sore. Mrs. A. Harrison, living in Place d'Armes, while attending to her household duties, struck her ankle against a sharp projection of the furniture. She took no notice of the injury, deeming it trivial. In a day or two the ankle began to swell and cause excessive pain. A doctor called in, found that dye from her stocking had entered the wound and set up blood-poison. Treatment with Zam-Buk followed, but it was several days before the limb was out of danger. "Hark! Hark! ## BRITISH LABORITES ISSUE ULTIMATUM

Manifesto Issued Insisting Upon Lords Veto Bill Preceding The Budget.

London, Feb. 17.—George M. Barnes, member of Parliament for Glasgow, who two days ago was elected chairman of the Labor party in Parliament, threw a bombshell into the political arena this afternoon in the shape of a manifesto, which, if acted upon, means the severance of the ties which heretofore have united the Liberals and the Laborites.

"I learn," writes Mr. Barnes, "that Premier Asquith is to hold office with regard to the veto and that the veto is to be dealt with after the budget. That, of course, will not be acceptable to the Labor party. It means that the powers that be, think the general election was not sufficiently decisive with regard to the Lords veto, and it infers, therefore, another election before the question of the Lords is settled. If another general election is to occur we should have it as soon as possible."

This manifesto, which has been sent to Premier Asquith, is generally accepted as an ultimatum; that in the event of this protest being disregarded, the Laborites will vote against the Government.

It is stated this afternoon that the Irish and Labor members contemplate moving an amendment to the address in reply to the King's speech, in which the issue of the rights of the Lords will be directly raised.

The Nationalists have been summoned to a meeting in Westminster on Monday, when Mr. Redmond will explain the situation and the result of his negotiations with the Government. It is understood that the proposed course of procedure in Parliament was to be a formal first reading of the House of Lords veto bill immediately after the address is voted. Then, in the interval, which is always necessary before the second reading is proceeded with, the budget will be reintroduced, and the two measures carried along practically side by side.

Asquith Seeking.  
Mr. Asquith this afternoon had an audience with the King, when he presented the final draft of the speech from the throne.

While an alliance between the Na-

tionalists and the Laborites in a campaign to force Premier Asquith to take up the matter of the veto before the budget undoubtedly presents a serious situation, the Premier himself does not appear to be afraid. He sought relaxation tonight by visiting the theatre. Mr. Asquith's speech on Monday next in Parliament will probably give the first real explanation of the Government's policy.

It is believed, in spite of today's threatening procedure, that neither the Nationalists nor the Laborites desire to force another general election, for which the party funds are not ready, and all difficulties may vanish when the veto bill, which the cabinet is drafting, sees light.
