THE HEBERT CASE

Father's Latest Move Makes His
Daughter an Illegitimate.

Montreal, May 3. — Answering the
opposition to judgment in the Hebert
marriage case, Emile Hebert has filed
a plea in the superior court in which
he maintains that this marriage to
Marie Emma Cloutier by a Protestant
clergyman was an illegal one. This
will also have the effect of declaring
that the two-year-old girl is illegiti-
mate for the same reason. His plea
reads as follows:
The plaintiff admits that the child,
Catherine Blanche Eva, was born of
the union of the defendant and plain-
tiff, but the plaintiff denies this union
to be a marriage in the sense of the
law.

To Marie Cloutier's plea that the
marriage could not be declared void,
and of no effect by an ecclesiastical
tribunal, Hebert answers: "The eccle-
siastical tribunal (in this case, the
tribunal of the Roman Catholic Church
of the Diocese of Montreal), is com-
petent to pronounce the annulment of
the non-existence of the religious or
spiritual bonds of the marriage cere-
mony, but this tribunal has never in
this case pronounced a decision as to
the civil effects of the marriage, but
its decree is only as a basis for the
judgment of the competent civil tri-
bunal."
