

GIVEN 2 YEARS FOR ROBBERY

Clarence Brackenbury of Brantford Held in Woodstock for London Crime.

CAPTURED LAST WEEK

WOODSTOCK, Dec. 5.—Clarence Brackenbury of Brantford was sentenced to two years in Kingston Penitentiary this afternoon on the charge of breaking into a general store at London last July and stealing a quantity of merchandise. Brackenbury was only apprehended last week.

At the non-jury sitting of the high court here today before Justice Latchford, the Norwich Mutual Fire Insurance Company sued the Oxford Garage for \$3,000, the amount paid K. Harvey of this city on a car he had destroyed in a fire at the garage. Judgment was reserved.

The Oxford County Council assembled this morning for the annual December session. However, the federal elections proved too much for the members, and this afternoon the council adjourned until after the election. The reading of a long list of communications was all that came before the council. A memorial was received from the provincial secretary's department, asking the council if it was in favor of a municipal franchise being extended to all or any of the following persons, 21 years of age or over: Wife, husband, sons, daughters, brothers, sisters, sons-in-law or daughters-in-law residing with the person possessing the necessary qualifications to vote at municipal elections.

"I was very much in love when I married, and quite sincere in my resolution to quit the stage," says Miss Barriscale.

"I was crazy about my baby boy, but—

well, now he's big enough so that I can divide my time between him and the stage."

Lillian Albertson is another who chose motherhood to the spotlight. She left the stage twelve years ago at the apex of success. "I have had that greatest of experiences," she says, "bringing a child into the world. I have cared for him tenderly until now he does not need all of my time. So I can return to the theatre."

"The Four Horsemen" At Grand Film of Keen Dramatic Appeal

Pictorial Production of Ibanez's Great Spanish Novel Preserves Psychological Interest and Characterization of Story With Remarkable Fidelity.

Opening a week's exhibition at the Grand Theatre, the much discussed film attraction, "The Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse" created a distinctly favorable impression before a crowded audience Monday evening. Whether this scenario rendering of Ibanez's great Spanish novel warrants the claim sometimes made for it as the greatest motion picture yet produced, is probably a matter of divided opinions, but in parts at least it may be fairly said to excel some corresponding parts in "Intolerance" and easily compares a great many other pictures for which claims to superlative excellence have been made.

The striking feature of the whole production is the remarkable fidelity with which the Ibanez characterization is preserved, and this may be reasonably advanced as the main reason for its unusual success in nearly all cities where it has been previously shown.

Carries Varied Plot.
Buenos Aires, Spain, France and Germany provide settings for the swift-moving, widely varied and deeply psychological plot which strikes the keynote of the fascination which the pictures holds for old and young.

A Spanish father's daughters marry French and German husbands, and when the grandfather dies, the families

leave the Argentine pampas for Europe. Julio Denoyers, the French hero of the play, finds in the studio life of Paris ample opportunity for the expression of the artistic wilfulness which he inherited from the grandfather. There are three sons in the German family, who growing up become coarsers in the wheels of the Imperial Prussian war machine.

Cousins Meet in Battle.
In the Great War the cousins are thrown happily into bloody combat on opposing sides, and in No Man's Land on the battle front Julio alongside of one of his German cousins is killed by a bursting shell.

A tender love story also runs throughout the plot, with the heroine enlisting as a Red Cross nurse when the black tide of war engulfs her along with the other characters.

The picture strongly indicates Ibanez's detestation of war. The action of a Canadian unit in the film deepens the interest for Canadian audiences. An augmented orchestra and the singing of the "Marselles" and "Hosanna" by Madame de Munk, of the Hambourg Conservatory, Toronto, adds immeasurably to the excellence of the program. On remaining nights of the week, Hawaiian selections by King brothers will be an additional feature.

NAZIMOVA STARS IN FILM 'CAMILLE'

Endows Part With Power and Charm At Loew's.

The vaudeville vies with a picture featuring the famous Nazimova at Loew's this week. It's a good bill.

The "Flying Howards," an aerial act, termed a sensation in the advance notices, comes pretty well up to all claims. Wilson and Wilson (colored) have a comedy singing and dancing act embracing a witty line that gets over well. "Hong-Kong Mysteries," entitled "Where Do the Ducks Go," an old act in a new way, takes well. The latter two acts are strong.

Ben Turpin in "Love's Outcast" provides much of the comedy, and then comes Nazimova in "Camille."

"Camille" is one of the great love stories of the world. Its story is of a woman of the shady side of Paris, and her love for Armand Duval, a young law student, a love which transports her to heights of sacrifice and plunges her finally to poverty and death.

In "Camille" Nazimova has done for the silver screen what Barnhardt, Eleanor Duse, Clara Morris, Olga Nethersole and Ethel Barrymore did for the stage. These artists won fame for their interpretations of the role of "Camille." Nazimova, no less than they, has endowed the part with a charm and power.

Nazimova has the role of "Camille," the woman of the underworld who loves a law student lifts to heights of devotion and sacrifice, and who returns to her showy, pitiful life upon learning that her sweetheart has abandoned his career for her sake.

It is a poignant tragedy that holds interest until the very end.

MILITARY OVERCOME SANTA CRUZ BANDIT

Buenos Aires, Dec. 6.—Governor forces have gained the upper hand over the bandits who have been terrorizing the inhabitants of the territory of Santa Cruz.

Two Husbands Under One Roof Land Woman in Court.

WINDSOR, Dec. 5.—"One of the most extraordinary cases I have ever heard of," Judge Gundy remarked in Windsor police court today when disposing of the case against Mrs. Pearl Cummings, 56 Campbell avenue, charged with bigamy. In spite of the fact that she had two husbands, both were living with her under the same roof. Family affairs went along harmoniously, they informed the court.

Police said that the triangular exploit went along perfectly for a year until Saturday night when Cummings, husband No. 1, quarrelled with George McDonald, husband No. 2, while under the influence of liquor.

In view of the circumstances, Judge Gundy allowed the woman to go on suspended sentence. The bigamy charge against McDonald was not pressed.

DECREASE IN SUPPLIES OF SUGAR REPORTED

Ottawa, Dec. 6.—(Canadian Press).—The sugar report for four weeks ending Nov. 5, issued by the Dominion bureau of statistics, shows that on Oct. 30 there was 21,946,049 pounds raw sugar on hand in Canada, as compared with 112,082,175 pounds at the same time last year.

Of refined sugar there was 34,405,655 pounds on hand, as compared with 42,428,983 pounds last year. The receipts of raw sugar for the period were 40,250,334 pounds compared with 39,553,734 pounds for the corresponding period last year.

In refined sugars, the quantity of granulated manufactured during the four-week period was 42,063,118 pounds, compared with 27,217,173 pounds last year. The quantity of yellow and brown sugars manufactured in the period was 4,640,511 pounds compared with 205,200 pounds in the same period last year. The total amount of sugar manufactured between Jan. 1 and Nov. 5 was 560,920,573 pounds, as compared with 730,866,308 pounds during the same period of 1920.
