PALMERSTON, Feb. 21.—London Alerts were refused permission to play any more games in the junior series of the N. H. L. during the season of 1922 by the league executive when it met here today. Manhattans thus win their protest. A sudden death game has been ordered between Manhattans and Tilsonburg, to be staged at either Ingersoll or St. Thomas on Friday of this week.

The executive refused to reconsider their ruling on players. Totten, Kenny and Tozer of the Alerts, and considered that Alerts should have excluded these men from their line-up when they met Manhattans in the first game, following out the text of a telegram sent by Secretary Bamford the afternoon of the game.

Alert Officials Surprised.

They had expected a reconsideration of the cases of the players in question, and while expecting to have the first game forfeited, were not prepared for their team's exclusion from further competition.
