Fire, which might have resulted disastrously to the Nurses' Home at Victoria Hospital swept the upper part of the building shortly after 10 o'clock this morning, and was only prevented from gaining serious headway by the quick action of the fire department and the manner in which internes at the hospital kept the blaze in check until firemen arrived. Considerable damage was done

Considerable damage was done through water and smoke. The loss was estimated by Fire Chief John Aitken to be about \$5,000.

Fifteen nurses, who had done night duty at the hospital, were sleeping in the third story of the building when the fire broke out. All of them escaped to the ground floor in their picts atting after passing the section

According to Chief Aitken the blaze started in a laundry chute running from the basement to the third floor. The flames crept up the chute to the attic, where they burst forth and ignited the whole of the roof. An open ventilator caused the flames to shoot upwards, burning the roof, rather than spreading to the nurses' rooms on the third floor.


