### CIDER SYRUP.

Place in a saucepan two cups of cider, add two and a half cups of sugar, and cook until the sugar is dissolved, cool and use.

### MINT COCKTAIL.

Place half a cup of sugar and one cup of water in a saucepan, bring to a boil and boil five minutes; pour over half a cup of mint leaves, and let stand until cool, strain and add two tablespoons of lemon juice and two tablespoons of orange juice. Fill six glass glasses with equal parts of cold orange, cold pineapple halved strawberries, and peeled and diced grapefruit. Pour over all the syrup, sprinkle chopped mint and garnish with a whole strawberry dipped in powdered sugar.

### KUROKI SALAD.

Chill six salad plates, place on each plate half a heart of romaine lettuce, cover the lettuce with alternate slices of peeled and cored pears, peeled peaches, and peeled

### HOT HAM SANDWICH.

Beat four tablespoons of butter to a cream, add half a cup of grated Canadian cheese, half a teaspoonful of mustard, and a seasoning of salt and paprika. Spread twelve slices of bread with this mixture. Run twelve ounces of cooked ham through the fine knife of the meat chopper, add to it two teaspoonfuls of made mustard, spread six of the prepared slices of bread with the ham, cover with the other six slices of bread, and press together. Beat three eggs slightly and beat into them one cupful of milk; dip the sandwiches in the egg and milk, lay in a hot well-buttered frying pan and fry a nice brown on both sides. Cut and serve on hot plates.

### NUT CAKE.

Beat half a cupful of butter to a cream and beat into it slowly one cupful of sifted sugar and beat smooth; beat in the grated rind of one lemon, three tablespoonfuls of grated orange rind and three tablespoonfuls of lemon juice; add the well beaten yolks of ten eggs, beat smooth and add three-quarters cupful of sifted flour sifted with three-quarters of a teaspoonful of baking soda, mix smooth, add the stiffly beaten whites of six eggs. Bake in three buttered and floured layer-cake tins in a moderate oven. Cool and spread between them a mixture of one and a half cups of finely chopped walnut meats, one and a half cups of tart red jelly, a few grains of salt, and one teaspoonful of lemon juice. Cover with white icing and decorate with walnut halves.

### TEA JULEP.

Cover two heaping teaspoonfuls of tea with four cups of fresh boiling water; let stand six minutes, strain and cool. Pour into a large glass pitcher half filled with cracked ice, add six sprays of fresh mint, one sliced and diced orange, the strained juice of two lemons, and one cup of cucumber peel, one pint of ginger ale and sugar to sweeten to taste. Mix well, let stand one hour, remove the mint and cucumber and pour into cold glasses and garnish each glass with a spray of fresh mint, and a whole strawberry.

## WITNESSES SWEAR BEER LACKED KICK

Proprietor of "Export" Scow Freed On "Selling" Charge.

## COURT OPINION

Special to The Advertiser.

Sarnia, Aug. 7.—Having survived fire and water within the last few days, the beer scow "Cuba," which operates on the St. Clair River at the foot of George Street, today survived the law in the Sarnia police court. The proprietor, Harry Loughead, was acquitted when the prosecution failed to show that the beer scow was of greater than 2 1/2 per cent. alcoholic strength. Three witnesses who told of buying beer from the scow, disclaimed knowledge of its potency and said it had no kick. One witness, however, Norman Tate, admitted that he became intoxicated from consuming the beer. In dismissing the case Magistrate Forman declared that it was a fact that since the scow had anchored in the bay or river the court had had more "drunk" cases than it had in the past. He also expressed the opinion if a conviction were registered it would rest on very slender ground and it was doubtful if it would be sustained in the event of an appeal.

### Must Pay Taxes.

In a notice issued today from the city tax collector's office delinquent taxpayers are advised to settle up all arrears at once, including the first installment of 1924 taxes, as no further notice will be given before seizures are made, and no time will be allowed after seizures.

Gilmore, from whose residence the funeral will be held privately on Friday. Survivors are two daughters, Mrs. Almada Flood, of Killings, Mont., Mrs. R. J. Gilmore of Sarnia, and six sons, Freeman and Harris of St. Marys, George and Ernest of Port Huron, Albert of Forest, Joseph of Watford.

### Building Revives.

Building operations here have started out actively for the month of August and the register of Inspector Walton shows permits issued to date of greater value than total number issued during entire month of July. The eleven permits granted, since August made its total \$27,075 in value and include four new houses and alteration work at the Sarnia General Hospital amounting to \$9,000.
