Toronto, Jan. 18 .- "Guilty; with a strong recommendation for mercy," was the verdict returned in the criminal assize court at the city hall tonight by a jury which tried Fred Clyma, a nineteen-year-old youth, on a charge of manslaughter in connection with the death of Mrs. Dora Colt, who was knocked down and fatally injured when a truck driven by the prisoner jumped the sidewalk on December 8 last.

"Your verdict is a proper one, and
