Waterloo Has Population of Five Thousand and Ninety One

Increase in Population Over Last Year is 135. While Increase in Assessment Amounts to \$253,000.

At the regular meeting of the Finance Committee of the town council held last evening Assessor Chas. H. Froelich presented his report. The report was most gratifying indeed and shows that the town has passed the 5000 mark and from all appearances is steadily growing. The population figures were 5091 an increase of 134 over last year and the percentage is on a par with other centres and even much better than some of the larger places can boast of. The increase in the assessment amounts to over a quarter of a million dollars namely \$253,000. Naturally there may be some complaints registered to be heard by the Court of Revision but the assessing has been done most carefully and it is not anticipated any reductions will be made. The increased assessment should bring down the tax rate next year.

The stores have been getting ready for weeks to make Waterloo's "Dollar Day" an occasion memorable in the commercial history of the town.

As far as winners were concerned at Ottawa yesterday there was nothing doing with the yellow and Black. Belle Mahone in the first race finishing third being beaten for the place by her former stable companion Silk Rustle. The dollar will swell to about twice its usual worth in Waterloo when "Dollar Day" arrives next week.

The residents on Shanley street between Charon and Braun are looking to the City for relief from a situation almost unbearable in its physical effect. Several inches of fine (six inches is a close figure) raised by an unusual amount of traffic to an unusual degree is the cause of the complaint. While the situation is especially aggravating at the present time it is annoying at all times when there is not sufficient moisture in the ground and complaints therefore are not of recent date. The disagreeableness in previous years lead residents to petition for oil on the street. The fact that the petition was later than the allotted time was the reason given by the Board of Works for laying over the petition.

This year nearby building operations on a big scale have necessitated much teaming on the street. This, coupled with the fact that the resident, have to bear the dust caused by operations with the wagon on the street, make the situation an unusual one.

The residents look for action and hope that the requirements of red tape as to time for petitions will not be a barrier to securing what they ask for.

FOR THE HOUSEKEEPER.

Cabbage if cooked in boiling salted water, uncovered, will be more digestible and will not sent the house as it does when cooked tightly covered.

In using a tablespoonful of material it is leveled off with a knife so is the teaspoon and the cup. Baking powder and soda should be free from lumps and lightened by tossing before measuring.

When washing white silk allow one tablespoonful of alcohol to every two quarts of water. Wash in the usual way with white soap. Roll in Turkish towel for ten minutes, then iron. Silk washed this way will keep pure white, and be like new every time it is laundered.

To clean sewer sink pipes use a teaspoonful of washing soda and cupful of vinegar, and when the soda is dissolved pour it down the sink.

Screw a small hook in the end of your broom and mop handles. Fine to hang them up by and to pull down a window or window shade.

(Continued from page 1.) of all taxes unpaid, so that such arrears may be entered on the current year's tax roll and tax bill.

What the amendment is to accomplish Commissioner Huennergard has been doing the last six years. It was a surprise to the Association to learn from him that this was the case and he received merited compliments for the system in use. Speaking to the Record on the clause he said: Under the present law arrears are not carried from one book to that of the following year. It consequently happens that a man may buy property and on investigation find that the taxes are paid. A few years later the scrutiny of a conveyancer reveals the fact that there are arrears unpaid. Six years ago I began carrying arrears to the account of the next year. You can thus learn in an instant whether or not the taxes are all paid.

An important matter acted on by the association was the proposal to amend the old clause of the Criminal law re the disposition of fines. The statute as amended over a year ago requires that fines in criminal cases be paid to the government. The change has made a difference of \$30,000 for the City of Toronto per annum and of between \$6000 and \$8000 for Hamilton.

Mr. Huennergard stated that the meeting was the best he ever attended. About 110 delegates representing 45 municipalities were present. The meetings are held in the City Hall. The guests were hospitably entertained by Mayor Church and the City Council. On Wednesday evening a banquet was provided after which the visitors were conducted to the exhibition.
