THE DOOMED PROTEUS.

LIENANT GARLINGTON'S OFFICIAL REPORT RECEIVED. An incompetent Captain and a greedy and faithless crew - Account of the voyage.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17. - The secretary of war has received the official report of Lieut. Garlington, commander of the recent Arctic expedition. It tends to show that Capt. Pike was not a careful and skilful navigator, as has been supposed.

On July 6 he ran past the harbor of Godhavn in entire ignorance of its proximity, although the weather was clear. On July 15 he ran the ship aground near the mouth of the great bay in consequence of neglecting to take soundings, and on the 16th he went entirely out of his course and ran in toward Cape Walker, supposing it to be Cape York, while the latter was 150 miles westward.

Garlington does not charge Pike with neglect or bad judgment in his conduct, but with "a slip" which crushed the Proteus. That he regards as an accident without constraint or negligence on the part of any of the crew. An unsigned written paper was enclosed in the report in regard to the behavior of Pike's crew. At their first alarm those on duty abandoned their posts and ran to save their property. As soon as the sailors began to go over to the ship's side they commenced to appropriate everything they wanted, breaking open and rifling boxes and trunks containing clothing and sailing's contents. Pike said, in reply to Garlington's report, that he was powerless to prevent the plundering. In explanation of his conduct, starting southward after the wreck instead of waiting for the Yantic, Garlington says he did not believe that the Proteus could get to Littleton island through such ice as they encountered, and that he expected to find at Cape York the Swedish steamer Sophia, and to avail himself of her assistance, in carrying out as far as possible, notwithstanding the disaster, the plan of Greely's relief.

The only instructions I ever received are the original instructions published at the time. An unsigned written paper was enclosed in an envelope with my instructions. The paper was simply an authenticated copy of the memorandum prepared by an officer in the signal office. I was informed that this memorandum was to form the basis of the instructions to be given to the commander of the vessel ordered to accompany the Proteus. The paper was not addressed or signed and bore no official marks. I have never at any time repeated it as an order, and was surprised to find the statement published that this paper was "supplementary instructions." Gen. Hazen in transmitting the report to the secretary of war says "the question of supplementary orders referred to by Garlington as having been issued, and in unfairness to himself in substance correctly stated by him, and the strictures made upon him so far as they refer to the question of disobedience have been unwarranted."

It is regrettable that Garlington has not explained some points in his report.

Episcopalian at Philadelphia. PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 19. - At the episcopal convention the house of deputies received a message from the house of bishops which was concurred in providing for the appointment of a joint committee to ascertain the facts and devise means for the relief of the colored people of the city of Philadelphia. The Rev. Dr. Dix New York presented the report of the joint committee on the report in French of the book of common prayer. It was resolved to accept the gift of Bishop Whipple of Minnesota, of a lot of ground near the centre of the city of Philadelphia, on which to build a home for the colored and orphaned of deceased clergymen, and to purchase the same.

The Duel Did Not Come Off. NEW YORK, Oct. 19. - A party of gentlemen drove to a secluded field near Calvary cemetery this morning for the purpose of fighting a duel. On arriving at the ground the difficulty was amicably settled and the principals shook hands. It is stated that they were well known New York society men, and that the feud originated by one making disparaging remarks about a lady with whom the other was acquainted.

A Business Man's Acquaintance. NEW YORK, Oct. 19. - Wm. Gwynner, president of the Hoole manufacturing company and a prominent industrial publican, died at his residence in New York city, Oct. 18, at the age of 63 years. He was 63 years of age. At one time he was general passenger agent of the Pennsylvania Railroad company, and subsequently auditor of that company.

Not Much for Georgia. GAINES, Ga., Oct. 19. - A. J. Jeter and F. H. Hedges met on the road near here yesterday and settled an old grudge by a bloody fight. Hedges was stabbed in the heart and Jeter in the head. The former is dead.

Robbed and Shot by a Companion. ALTOONA, Pa., Oct. 19. - Cart Warbeck of New York was shot through the mouth near this city by a travelling companion named Burns, who travelled with him of \$250 cash.

Fatal Explosion in a Colliery. LONDON, Oct. 19. - An explosion occurred last night in Wharfedale Colliery near Barnsley. Twenty-three men in the pit are reported to have all perished. Three bodies have been recovered. When the explosion occurred five men rushed to the shaft and were drawn up alive though injured. Twenty men remaining in the pit were lost. The falling of the roof delays the work of the searchers for the bodies. It is supposed that the explosion was caused by a blast shot.

Aid For the Earthquake Sufferers. LONDON, Oct. 19. - Lord Granville suffering a despatch from Lord Dufferin saying that the British consul at Chios reports that 1600 persons on the mainland were killed or wounded by the earthquake and assistance is urgently required. Granville has sent the despatch to the lord mayor who will receive directions for the sufferers.

Changes in the Cabinet. OTTAWA, Oct. 19. - It is officially announced that Sir John Macdonald is to retire from the ministry of the interior, and is to be succeeded by Hon. D. L. Macpherson. Sir John becomes president of the council, retaining the office of superintendent-general of Indian affairs and controller of the Northwest mounted police.

FUN AT AN OYSTER SUPPER.

A Social Termination in a Free Fight - One Man Carried Home on a Stretcher. BELLEVILLE, Oct. 19. - While an oyster supper was being given in the Methodist church last night, Wm. Smith and Captain John Sackett, brothers-in-law, quarreled and exchanged blows. Friends joined in and a free fight followed. Lamps were knocked out of the brackets and broken. Women and children made frantic efforts to leave the building. Many were knocked down and trampled on. Ten persons were injured, including the pastor, who was seriously kicked and beaten. Sackett is confined to his bed.

NEWS FROM OTTAWA. Thanksgiving Day Appointed - A Photographer's Revenge.

OTTAWA, Oct. 19. - Thursday, Nov. 8, has been appointed a day of thanksgiving throughout the Dominion.

A LUNATIC LEAP. John Buchanan Jumps from the Window of a Moving Train.

LONDON, Oct. 19. - Last night when the east-bound express was nearing Bothwell, a man threw himself out of a window and leaped from the car. He was picked up afterwards, badly out, and with several bones broken. His name is John Buchanan of Toronto, and his mind is disordered.
