CHARLEY MITCHELL BEATS AN OLD MAN.

LONDON, Oct. 4.—Charley Mitchell, the pugilist, was in possession of a dock of the Bow-street Police Court this morning to answer a charge of assault. At midnight Mitchell had a fight with an old man named Salvo in a street of the Strand. Both men had been drinking. How the trouble started has not been ascertained, but after a few words Mitchell suddenly struck the old man a savage blow on the side of the head which fell him to the ground. A crowd gathered, shouting "Shame! Shame!" etc. A policeman next to Mitchell saw the fight and ran to the scene. Mitchell was arrested and taken to the police station. He was charged with assault on the person of the old man, named Salvo, who was aged 65 years. Mitchell was fined £5 and costs, and committed to the House of Correction for 14 days.

THE GERMAN ARMY BILL.

The Prussian Ministry Object to Von Caprivi's Conscription Bill.

BERLIN, Oct. 4.—Some of the papers of this city comment upon a reported difficulty between Chancellor Von Caprivi and the Prussian Ministry arising from the former's laying the Army Bill before the Bundestag prior to the discussion of the provisions of the measure by the ministers. The National Assembly has just passed the union of the King of Prussia and the German Emperor in one person. It is possible that the Prussian Ministry is able to explain its views to the King before he, as Emperor, gives assent to the Prussian conscription bill. The bill is expected to be passed in the Bundestag.

THE DEADLY RIVER CROSSING.

A Freight Train Struck a Crowded Street Car—The Despatches Report Him Striking His Head—His Majesty Makes Frequent Enquiry as to His Condition.

CINCINNATI, Oct. 4.—A switch engine backing up the Cincinnati, Washington and Baltimore road at Harrison-avenue to-night struck a John-street horse car, killing two people and wounding five, before shaking up 23. The switchman at the crossing permitted the street car to attempt to cross the track, and the freight cars struck the rear platform, on which were seven persons, cutting off the end of the car as smoothly as if with a razor. Two of the seven on the platform were killed, one and perhaps two were fatally injured, probably fatally. The others were dangerously hurt. The dead are John Fisher, aged 32, thrown under the car and cut to pieces, and a woman, whose name is not known, who was thrown from the car and killed. The injured are: Barney Fitzpatrick, back and spine injured; William Howard Johnson of Fairmont, skull fractured; the right leg broken; probably fatally injured; Jacob Demhart, a 15-year-old boy, left leg crushed, very serious. The slightly injured are: Jacob Hermann and Jacob Spengler.
