

## FINE RECORD IN TAX COLLECTIONS

Figures Show Folly of Criticism of Drayton's Department

COMPARISONS ARE GIVEN  
Canada's Arrears Very Light Compared With Others

OTTAWA, Nov. 29.—(Special to The Free Press).—Appropos criticisms that have been made, as a result of the Revenue Commission's arrears in taxes, of the Government's collection of the business profits tax, the following comparative figures of the collection of business profits in Canada, England and the United States, are illuminating: Canada—Assessments, 1917 and 1918 accounting periods, \$34,000,000; amount unpaid, \$149,631; assessments, 1919 accounting period, \$38,500,000; amount unpaid, not in excess of \$1,050,000. United States—According to statements in American financial journals, and undoubtedly authoritative, outstanding income and excess profits taxes assessed but unpaid total \$600,000,000. Great Britain—In his budget speech last year Mr. Chamberlain estimated that on March 31 last he would have £400,000,000 (\$2,000,000,000) of excess profits duties arrears to collect. From Finance and Commerce of February 5, 1921. Thus Canada's collection of business profits and income taxes is more efficient, more thorough and more complete than collection of similar taxes in either the United States or England, this despite the much greater experience that Britain has had in the collection of this kind of taxation. Canada is short a little over a million, the United States 600 million and England two billions.

URGES LASH FOR THIEVES.  
WINNIPEG, Nov. 29.—Twenty-six and a half years' sentences were handed out by Magistrate McDonald today to men convicted on various charges of theft. Sir Hugh, in an interview with The Free Press, declared in favor of the lash for the suppression of crime in Winnipeg.

## FATHER AND SON PERISH TOGETHER

George Howell and Son Suffocated in Fire at Chatham

DEFECTIVE PIPE BLAMED  
Parent Gives Life in Vain Attempt to Save Lad

CHATHAM, Nov. 29.—(Special to The Free Press).—A fatal fire occurred in this city about 7 o'clock to-night, in which George Howell and his 15-year-old son, George, lost their lives. The boy had not been feeling well and retired to his room in the upstairs of his home early in the evening. Half an hour afterwards the family downstairs noticed smoke issuing from the stairway, and the mother called to her husband, who was sawing wood in the backyard. He rushed upstairs, calling to his son, and was overcome by the smoke.

FORTUNATE FALL.

A neighbor, who went up with him, fell over the balustrade to the floor below, and it is thought thereby accidentally saved himself from suffocation. When the firemen arrived on the scene the top part of the house was in flames, but it was soon extinguished and the bodies of the father and son recovered. It is believed the fire started from a defective stovepipe. No inquest will be held.

Howell was a returned soldier, having been a member of the 18th Battalion, and a present member of the Kent Regiment Band. His son was the eldest of a family of five small children. The boy's clothing was partly burned, but it was quite evident that they both died of suffocation.

## ISAAC CAMPBELL BACKS MEIGHEN

Leading Liberal in West Supporting the Government

APPROVES ITS RECORD

Declares Canada Needs Meighen for Problems Ahead

OTTAWA, Nov. 29.—(Special to The Free Press).—For 30 years Isaac Campbell, K. C., Winnipeg, has been the most respected and most influential Liberal west of Ontario. He had the complete confidence of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Unable through illness to take the platform in favor of Premier Meighen he has issued the following statement:

"I am supporting George N. Jackson for South Winnipeg. Since the union in 1917 the Borden and Meighen governments have done well. Their problems have been more difficult than Canada ever faced before. The problems still ahead give cause for anxiety. We need a steady, firm and consistent administration." George N. Jackson is the Meighen candidate in South Winnipeg and is opposed by Hon. A. B. Hudson, former attorney-general in the Norris Government.

## SAYS REVISION OF U.S. TARIFF COMING SOON

Sentors Smoot and Penrose Deny That Matter Will be Postponed Until 1923.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—Hearings on the tariff bill will be resumed by the Senate Finance Committee December 7. Although Chairman Penrose said they would close in December, much doubt is expressed of this in other quarters.

Replying to rumors that tariff revision would be delayed until 1923, Senators Smoot and Penrose predicted revision in the regular session of Congress which meets next Monday.

## RESIGNATIONS OF 87 TEACHERS ACCEPTED

New Westminster School Board Takes Action; Trouble Over Salaries.

NEW WESTMINSTER, B. C., Nov. 29.—The resignation of 87 teachers from the high, technical and public schools of the city were accepted last night by the board of school trustees.

The resignations, which take effect on December 31, were handed in last week as a protest by the teachers against alleged unfair treatment in the matter of salaries.

A motion to dismiss six teachers who had not handed in their resignations was dismissed.

## BESIEGED WITH APPEALS TO PROVIDE WORK FOR BRITISH UNEMPLOYED

LONDON, Nov. 29.—The Government unemployment committee, which deals with applications from local authorities for grants for public works to relieve unemployment, is snowed under with applications from all parts of the country.

In the last month the committee has sanctioned schemes costing £4,250,000, and giving employment to 50,000 men on the construction of roads, tramways, docks, parks and gas and electric works.

## NEW ZEALAND SHIPMENTS.

LONDON, Nov. 29.—Reuters' correspondent at Wellington, N. Z., reports that during the year ending October 31, New Zealand exported to Great Britain, including imperial stock and consignments transferred from America, 789,000 quarters of beef, 5,383,000 carcasses of mutton and 1,320,000 carcasses of lamb.

## CANADIAN FARMERS TAKE 18 OUT OF 21 PRIZES FOR GRAIN

CHICAGO, Nov. 29.—(By The Free Press).—Eighteen out of 21 awards were captured by Alberta and Saskatchewan farmers at the International grain and hay show here.

In the hard red spring wheat exhibit first prize went to G. W. Kraft, of Bozeman, Mont., and second prize to H. C. Strange, of Fern, Alta. The Duke and Duchess of Sutherland, of Brooks, Alta., were also in the prize list in this class.

Seager Wheeler, of Roseburg, Sask., was also a consistent winner in the hard red spring wheat classes.

## BELIEVES PLAN WILL STOP RUM-RUNNING ALONG THE BORDERS

TORONTO, Nov. 29.—James Hales, chief license commissioner for Ontario, has made arrangements with the United States prohibition authorities, which, it is believed, will operate to prevent

importations of liquor by persons in the province. Under the United States law a permit must be secured before liquor can be exported and the authorities on the other side have undertaken to consult the license board before issuing permits for shipments to this province. The board, however, is not in a position to reciprocate fully, since the province has no power to prevent bona fide exports. The Ontario officials, however, are co-operating to the fullest extent within their power.

Commissioner Vining, of the Public Utilities Board, has been confined to his home with bronchial trouble since Saturday last. He has been unable to attend any of the ward meetings.

ILL EIGHT WEEKS.  
CHATHAM, Nov. 29.—The death occurred last night of one of the most respected residents of the County of Kent, in the person of Jane Everitt, widow of the late Andrew Everitt, of Harwich Township. Mrs. Everitt was 73 years of age and was taken ill about eight weeks ago. She took a sudden

turn for the worse yesterday and passed away quickly. Mrs. Everitt is survived by one son, Alex., and a sister, Mrs. Manson Campbell, of this city, and one brother, John McNaughton. The funeral will be held on Wednesday at 3.30 from her late residence, 207 Park street, to the Maple Leaf Cemetery. Rev. A. S. Orton will conduct the funeral service.
