preme Court of Ontario gave an important decision of interest to the financial and commercial community at Toronto holding that the common law respecting presentment of checks for payment prevails in Ontario, and that if persons holding checks, be they banks or private individuals, do not present them at the bank named on the face of the check on the day or day after they are dated and issued, the signatory of the check is not liable if no funds are found when the check is presented later than the time mentioned.

The Post-office Department is considering whether or not it would be possible to undertake the collection of parcels for transmission by mail in cities where there is a mail delivery service.

#### Canadian Peace Centenary Association

The movement for celebrating the Hundred Years of Peace between the British Empire and the United States is, judging by a circular just issued by the Canadian Peace Centenary Association, taking rapid hold in Canada, Great Britain and the United States. The general proposals contain four main features, (1) Monuments and other memorials, (2) Thanksgiving Services in the Churches, (3) Educational Propaganda, (4) Festivities. The Circular enumerates various suggestions regarding the erection of monuments, and states that the matter has been referred to an International Committee.

February 14, 1915, has been selected for Thanksgiving services in all the churches of the British Empire and the United States. This date is the nearest Sunday to February 17th, 1915, the centenary of the ratification of the Treaty of Ghent. The educational propagandists include several important features among which may be mentioned the preparation of a series of pamphlets dealing with the various treaties which have made the long peace possible, which it is intended to send to all the schools in Canada. Tablets and masques are in course of preparation which will also be sent to the schools for production upon a date to be hereafter arranged. A somewhat unique proposal is that schools in Canada and the United States in places bearing the same name should be invited to exchange shields. It is intended to arrange for the writing of competitive essays on Anglo-American relations and provision is being made for Provincial and Dominion prizes.

About 100 centres have been chosen for special celebrations in Canada and strong local Committees have been arranged for in a majority of these. The circular also reports the progress made in Great Britain and the United States and contains replies received last Christmas from World Rulers to a message sent in connection with the celebration by the American Committee. The Dominion Government has arranged for an appropriation to meet the preliminary organization expenses. In announcing this the Rt. Hon. R. L. Borden said: "The cause which the Canadian Peace Centenary Association and the corresponding bodies in the United States and the United Kingdom have set before them is one with which we are warmly sympathetic. It is a triumph of humanity that during a century of rapid development, despite the existence of serious international differences and problems, the British Empire and the United States have found wiser and more humane methods of adjusting differences than the arbitrament of war. We welcome the achievement of a century of peace, and hope it will prove to be but the first century of peace, the forerunner of a long series stretching into the future as far as human anticipation can trust itself. The list of members is a most representative one and contains the names of all the Lt.-Governors, all the Ministers of Education and nearly all the Premiers in Canada. Among those prominent in this province who have identified themselves with this movement may be mentioned:—The President of the Canadian Peace Centenary Association is Sir Edmund Walker, of Toronto, and the Honorary Secretary Major Hamilton. #### A BIG DIFFERENCE

A factory patron may think and even remark "I guess my cows average about as high a test as Brown's, so it doesn't make any difference whether I have them tested or not."

Let us examine that a moment. If a man is content with only a fair yield per cow, where is general improvement to come in? Surely we are not going to remain satisfied with what a neighbor's medium cows manage to produce? Will that not kill all ambition?

If it is found that in another section the average yield per cow is 150 or 250 pounds of milk higher, should not the endeavor be made to raise the standard of production for each of the poorer cows?

Again, the yield of milk may average the same at two different factories, but the average yield of fat may be four or six pounds more. So if there are only 200 cows sending to the factory there would be a difference in the output of over fourteen hundred pounds of butter in one month.

So it does make a difference what a patron's cows test. Why view with complacency any "average" herd, some cows of which give only a small yield of milk testing only 2.9 or 3.1 when the herd might quickly be graded up and have each cow give 5 or 6 pounds more fat per month?

It makes a big difference to you personally as a live, up-to-date, progressing dairyman, a difference in the capacity and value of your herd, a difference in your support of the factory, and a difference in the possibility of increased output of your factory at a lower cost. It will pay you well to test each cow.

The new invention enables the image of any object to be transmitted and reproduced before the eyes of a spectator miles away, just as the telephone transmits and reproduces the tones of the voice. "The tones of the human voice, of which there are hundreds of gradations," says Dr. Low, the inventor, "can be reproduced by wireless telephony. Based on the new Dairy Act passed this session regulations have been passed effective September 1 and providing fines from \$10 to \$30 for each offence in cases of improper making of butter and cheese. Butter containing whey is to be marked and sold as "whey butter." Mixtures of creamery and dairy butter are to be branded as dairy butter. Cheese intended to the manufacture of which skimmed milk has entered must be branded before leaving the factory with the words "skimmed milk cheese." No person is to use the word "Canada" on butter or cheese boxes or packages unless the product has been actually made in Canada.
