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

Panama Canal Treaty is Dead. Washington, September 22.—When the state department closed to-day it was agreed that the Panama Canal treaty was dead, although eight hours remained within which the Colombian Congress might take action on it. Nothing however, had been during the day from either Beaupre, at Bogota, or from Dr. Herran, the Colombian charge here, who gave the slightest hope of a favorable issue. A report is current that the Colombian congress, in secret session, has clothed President Marraquin with full power to negotiate a treaty. If this report should turn out to be true President Marraquin, who is counted a friend of the treaty, could proceed untrammelled by the fear of the future reckoning with his congress. At any rate President Roosevelt must now take the next step.
