USEFUL HINTS FOR EXECUTIVES.
Editor Militia Gazette,-I offer a few friendly suggestions, which, if taken into consideration by the executives of the D. R. A. and Provincial rifle associations, I think might be the means of proving a benefit both to the competitors and associations. I understand that the targets at Ottawa are to be divided into sections as they were in Montreal; and if so, there ought not to be more than three sections-that would make eleven targets to each.

After the experience of going through the P. Q. R. A. matches I think to have them divided into any smaller sections will only cause confusion, as it did in Montreal, which was the sad experience of more than one competitor, who fired on his own target according to number, but after the register keeper calked out " miss," found out to his surprise that he had hit the target with the corresponding number on the next section; in one case that 1 am aware of, by so doing it threw the competitor out of the prize list, as it did also the team with which he fired.

Another very important matter to be looked into is this: to know that every marker knows how to mark properly, and also that every register keeper knows the signals when they appear and the number of points value they represent. I saw three cases where the register keeper was checked for giving bull's-eyes for magpies at the P. Q. R. A. matrhes last week, and also where a competitor would have got a bull's-eye for an outer at the last O. R. A. matches, and that at 200 yards into the bargain -a clear case of incompetency. If all accounts are true the same thing has also happened at the D. R. A. meetings. The trouble
