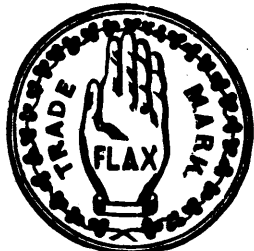

Mercantile Summary.

THERE is a break in the price of steel rails in
England, the fact that the capacity of the con-
verters is so much greater than the demand has
led to a sale of 80,000 tons for future delivery at
\$20 per ton.

THE Elmira council have been asked if they
feel disposed to give a bonus to a flour mill.
The proposed establishment would be a roller
mill with a capacity of 750 bushels a day, and
would cost \$35,000.

THE Berlin glue factory has changed hands,
the *News* says. It has been sold by Mr. Fischer
to J. Fennell & Geo. Lang, who purpose turning
it into a tannery for the manufacture of a finer
class of leather, such as is used for making
gloves, mitts, slippers, &c.

For some months past, the Berlin firm of
Breithaupt Bros. & Hall, composed of L. J. and
J. C. Breithaupt and Z. A. Hall, have been put-
ting up at Penetanguishene one of the largest
and most complete tanneries in Ontario. It has
just commenced operations.

THE smallness of Atlantic grain receipts is
noticeable. Ordinarily they are much greater
than the reported shipments of the eight North-
western markets, as the Atlantic ports receive
from a great many inferior points from which
the grain reaches them without passing through
a lake port or other place that reports grain
receipts. But in every month since March last
the Northwestern shipments have exceeded the
Atlantic receipts, as follows: In the five
months, April to August, the Northwestern ship-
ments were 95,630,197 bushels and the Atlantic
receipts 19,679,002, or 20 per cent. less than
that amount. This indicates an unusually
great domestic consumption in the country
between the West and the seaboard.

THE profits of the Western Union Telegraph
Company have been affected somewhat by the
strike, but not much. In declaring a dividend
for the quarter ending with September, it is
stated that the actual net earnings for the quar-
ter ending with June were \$1,639,897; while for
the quarter ending with September, "based
upon nearly completed returns for July, partial
returns for August, and estimating for Septem-
ber," they will be about \$1,600,000. As there
certainly was a falling off in business during the
strike, to make these net earnings there must
have been a reduction of expenses somewhere.
There was a great saving in not having the
striking employees to pay while it lasted, but
the extra pay to operators working overtime and
the high wages to others, were heavy items.
The business of the quarter has been a large
one.
