**International Air Services Transit Agreement**

Done at Chicago, December 7, 1944

**Convention on Psychotropic Substances**

Done at Vienna, February 21, 1971

*Reservation*

"Whereas Canada is desirous of acceding to the Convention on Psychotropic Substances, 1971, and whereas Canada's population includes certain small clearly determined groups who use in magical or religious rites certain psychotropic substances of plant origin included in the schedules to the said Convention, and whereas the said substances occur in plants which grow in North America but not in Canada, a reservation of any present or future application, if any, of the provisions of the said Convention to peyote is hereby made pursuant to Article 32, paragraph 3 of the Convention."

**International Convention on Standards of Training, Certification and Watchkeeping for Seafarers, 1978**

Done at London, July 7, 1978  
Canada's Instrument of Accession deposited  
November 6, 1987  
In force April 28, 1984

*Reservation*

"The Government of Canada reserves its position with regard to the provisions of paragraph 6(d) of the Appendix to Regulation II/2 and paragraph 16 of the Appendix to Regulation II/4 in the Annex to the International Convention on Standards of Training, Certification and Watchkeeping for Seafarers, 1978 in respect of the compulsory knowledge of an ability to use the English language.

The position of the Government of Canada is that the provisions of those paragraphs which refer to the ability to use navigational publications in English, and the need to have an adequate knowledge of the English language, are not applicable to Canada as there are two official languages in Canada: English and French. Both languages have equal status, consequently candidates for certificates may choose to be examined in either language."
