Exciting Canadian artists to perform at Expo'92

Entertainment has always been a natural component of an exposition since expositions are rooted in the European tradition of regional fairs in which entertainers were an integral part.

Accordingly, an important entertainment program will take place in and around the Canada Pavilion during Expo'92.

Great World Artists (GWA) of Ottawa has created an entertainment program involving 108 individual and group performers. From the opening of Expo'92 on April 20 to the October 12 closing, performers will be part of the Canadian participation.

A special Canada Day entertainment program, highlighting the 125th anniversary of Confederation, will be also be created by GWA's impresarios Michael Tabbitt and Joan Cripton.

Almost all types of entertainers

will be performing: folk singers, mimes, rock groups, big band musicians, dancers, jugglers and clowns. Musicians will play everything from acoustic guitars to multi-level electronic keyboards.

All provinces and territories will be represented by the performers who will draw on Canadian and international roots.

Spain, home of the flamenco guitar, will also be treated to a Canadian artist's rendition of this traditional music.

Works from the Art Bank collection will be shown in the VIP lounge and the office of the Commissioner General.

The Art Bank will showcase a selection of Canadian artists' work at the Arts Pavilion from June 29 to July 12.
