Hon. Lloyd Axworthy (Minister of Employment and Immigration): Comprehensive statistics, which would provide information on the amounts spent on adult training programs for all native people, including status Indians, non-status Indians, Métis and Inuit were not compiled before April 1, 1979. However, information on the amounts spent for training courses purchased for status Indians on reserves is available and is as follows:
