EXERCISE CARE IN USE OF SCALES

Inspector of Weights and Measures Calls Attention to Breaches of Law.

Mr. McConvey, inspector of weights and measures, wishes it to be understood that family scales must not be used for commercial purposes, and the \$10 fines imposed on Tom Bartlett and Jacob Marx by Magistrate Cohen yesterday afternoon, may have had the effect on the victims which Inspector McConvey desired. These family scales, which are imported from the United States, are of a cheaper grade than those of our own make, and are not reliable enough for use in trade. Their use is detrimental to manufacturers of commercial scales as well as being unfair to purchasers of goods weighed by cheaper scale. It is not merchants, but street hucksters who are inclined to break the law in this respect, and it is to this latter class that the two men who appeared before Magistrate Cohen belonged. "The ordinance with regard to family scales is going to be enforced," stated Inspector McConvey.


