Canadian Federation of Labor Convention Concludes Business at Brockville.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS

New President Makes His Announcement of Policy for Year.

BROCKVILLE, Oct. 10 .- (Special) .convention of the Canadian Federation of Labor concluded its session here today, and decided to meet next year in Toronto. Much business was crowded into the closing hours, inuding the election of officers as fol-

cluding the election of officers as follows:

President, G. Pepper, Ottawa; vice-president, I. C. A. Laroche, Quebec City; sec. treas., G. G. Mercure, Ottawa; vice-president for Ontario, Jabez Shaw, Toronto; Nova Scotia, S. R. McNeil, Glace Bay; Quebec, J. N. Richard, Quebec City; legislative committee, Chas. G. Pepper, L. C. A. Laroche, G. Mercure, John Moffatt; Dominion, James Mack, Toronto.

Net Hostile to International.

The new president in acknowledging the honor conferred upon him, stated that he would follow along the lines of his predecessor. In regard to the International Federation of Labor, he was not hostile to it, but he did not wish this to be taken as indicative that he would not do his utmost to advance the interest of the Canadian Federation of Labor as antagonistic to the rival organization.

The executive made pronouncement on the Quebec situation, where more or less friction has existed the past year. All unions in the city willing to join the Canadian Federation lof Labor, and comply with all its laws, can be and shall be admitted to the trades council now connected with the federation. The Quebec delegates acquiesced in the recommendation.

The committee reassured the convention that the United Mine Workers were practically out of commission in the province of Nova Scotia, after devoting much time and money in an endeavor to disorganize the Provincial Workman's Association.
