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If the Instructions of the Crown
 be such, that the Nature, Change,
 or present Circumstances of Af-
 fairs in the said Colonies put the
 Governors under any Necessity of
 varying from the said Instructions,
 that is a good Reason why the said
 Governors should represent their
 Difficulties in a proper Manner to
 the Crown, and humbly propose
 the Remedy, and such further Di-
 rections as the Nature of the Case
 or Emergency of the Affair may
 require ; but the said Governors
 ought not, in any Event whatso-
 ever, to depart from the Royal
 Orders and Instructions of the
 Crown, as the Delay which may
 be thereby occasioned cannot be

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
