If the Instructions of the Crown be fuch, that the Nature, Change, or present Circumstances of Affairs in the faid Colonies put the Governors under any Necessity of varying from the faid Instructions, that is a good Reason why the said Governors should represent their Difficulties in a proper Manner to the Crown, and humbly propose the Remedy, and fuch further Directions as the Nature of the Case or Emergency of the Affair may require; but the faid Governors ought not, in any Event whatfoever, to depart from the Royal Orders and Instructions of the Crown, as the Delay which may be thereby occasioned cannot be put
