TOMLINSON INQUEST OPENS DEATH WAS BY SUFFOCATION

James Cooney, Retained on Vagrancy Charge, Cannot Satisfactorily Explain Whereabouts.

James Cooney of 413 West King-street was arrested upon a charge of vagrancy yesterday morning after the adjournment of the inquest held into the death of Wm. Tomlinson. He cannot explain satisfactorily where he spent the interval between 10.30 Monday night, when he saw the body of the dead man, until Tuesday morning, when he was one of the two who discovered it. He said he slept on a lumber pile on Dufferin-street, but his alibi was not satisfactory. Chief Coroner Johnson, who is conducting the investigation, said: "Dr. A. G. Harrington states death was due to suffocation. By Tomlinson bending his neck in a posture similar to the one in which the man was last seen alive, the wind might have been driven into his lungs, and he would have died. It is certain about the case, and that is the deceased was not only drinking heavily, but he was mixing his drinks badly. Young fellows with him said they saw him take a drink of whiskey, which he tied about his forehead. He had to be taken to a hospital, and after he had been treated for some time he died. The inquest was adjourned until Tuesday at the Gladstone Hotel.

NOT OVERTOOL DAY.

King Edward Guest Lost Wearing Apparel—Man Arrested. Alfred Thomp went to the King Edward Hotel yesterday morning. He did not register. He stayed a short time about the corridors and then walked out the main entrance with two very nice and very much overcoats under his arm. Detective Thompson, the house sleuth, went out immediately afterwards, and they walked as far as Thomp's home at 95 Jarvis-street, Thomp leading and the detective hot on the scent some paces behind. Then the detective went back to the hotel and found a foreign guest bewailing the loss of a coat. Thomp went back to the pawnbroker's place near Thomp's home and waited. Soon his man came along wearing one coat and carrying another. He evidently meant to pawn the coat, but lost his nerve. The detective "threw his net" and showed him a name in the inner pocket. Thomp had no more to say, but went quietly to the station. Thomp has appeared on the main charge before, and seems to have a mania for overcoats.

HIGH COURT I. O. F. IN ANNUAL SESSION

COL. PELLIATT ANNOUNCES

Addresses Regiment at First Drill—Arrangements Are Complete for Visit of 74th from Buffalo.

As a finishing touch to place them in shape to receive their Yankee cousins, the 74th National Guard of Buffalo, the Queen's Own rifles were called out to drill last night. They reported well up to the usual quota, and after being put thru their facings in the armories they marched over several of the downtown streets.

When the regiment returned to the quarters at the Union Station on Saturday morning between 10 and 11 o'clock, and will be met by the Q.O.R. in full dress uniform from the station and thence to the Stanley Barracks, where they will be camped to receive them. The 74th will be about 600 men strong.

On Saturday and Monday afternoons, in front of the Grand stand at the exhibition, they will present what is known as the "night drill." All members of the Q.O.R. in uniform will be admitted to the grounds and to the grand stand on that day free of charge. On Sunday evening the regiment will attend the divine services at St. James' Cathedral in full dress uniform. During the stay of the regiment, any member of it will be carried on the street railway free of charge. On Saturday evening a dinner will be tendered to the officers of the visiting regiment by the officers of the Q.O.R. The sergeants will do the honors of the entertainers of the Yankee regiment.

On Sunday evening the officers of the regiment will be entertained at the home of Col. Pellatt. It is likely that many of the men of the regiment will be invited to the homes of the Canadian soldiers.

Col. Pellatt said last night that the best way to welcome the regiment was to extend to the American regiment was for the members of the Q.O.R. to turn out in uniform during their stay in Toronto.
