Usual Fruitful Session of the Canadian Association.

Several Important Amendments Adopted.
—To Negotiate with the A. A. of C.—
Will Renegate Shoot into Goal Nets—
A Good List of Officers Elected—Reports
of the Play for a Year.

The Canadian Lacrosse Association held the eleventh annual convention at Richmond Hall yesterday, under most favorable circumstances. There were delegates from all parts of Ontario, even as far east as Cornwall, 34 clubs being represented, as follows:

The Council in Session.
The day's work was commenced by a council meeting, held at the Rosin House, on the morning at which the delegates and counts were present at this meeting. President J. J. Craig, Ferguson (accl.); Secretary, D. A. Rose, Toronto; P. McMillan, Beaverton; J. D. Bailey, Toronto; W. H. Hill, Markham; H. B. Clemen, Fort Perry; B. R. Keen, Orillia.

Readers passing the accounts, the council considered the application of J. S. A. Macdonald for reinstatement. He was suspended by the O.H.A., and wanted permission to play lacrosse in the C.I.A. championship. After some discussion it was granted.

The cases of Coppel of Seaforth, Guelph of Toronto, Tudhope of Stonerville and Glover of Markham, who were suspended last season, were also considered, but nothing was done, except that a recommendation was passed in favor of Glover's reinstatement.

At 2.30 the delegates met in Richmond Hall to hold the annual convention and election of officers.

After the delegates had heard in their credentials, the Credentials Committee's report was read by Secretary W. S. A. Hartley, as follows:

The Secretary's Report.
It is with pleasure that I now present the eleventh annual report of your council. Your council with gratification the increasing interest in our national game in the Province. During the past season the various district championships were keenly contested, as well as the annual and final matches. Owing to the resignation of Mr. Vance, W. S. A. Hartley was appointed to fill the office, which occurrence somewhat curtailed the details of this report.

The various districts were won by the following: Northeastern, Orillia; York, Markham; Western, Arthur; Bruce, no competition; Quince, Madoc; Southern, Simcoe; Royal, Strathroy; Huron, no competition; York Junior, Elms II.; Central, Dufferin of Orangeville; Grey, Dundas; Shelburne, Huron; Twin City of Berlin.

The other championships were won as follows: Toronto, Neumesh, Toronto; Intermediate, Dufferin of Orangeville; Junior, Elms II. of Toronto.

On account of Mr. Moore of Barrie being removed from the county, Mr. R. R. Keen of Orillia was elected in his place by the council.

This report was followed by that of the

auditors, which showed receipts of \$1013.15, disbursements of \$884.72, leaving a balance in the bank of \$428.43.

The List of Officers.
The election of officers was the next order of business, and some good speeches were made by the nominees. The following were elected to look after the interest of the association for 1898:

Hon. president, J. J. Craig, Ferguson (accl.); president, T. H. Lennox, Aurora (accl.); first vice-president, T. R. Givens, Mount Forest; second vice-president, T. McMillan, Beaverton; secretary-treasurer, W. S. A. Hartley; council, E. F. Seagram, Waterloo; H. H. Thompson, Mitchell; E. McIntyre, Grand Valley; W. H. Hill, Markham; I. King, Peterborough; J. D. Bailey, Fort Perry; A. E. Cameron, Beaverton.

The session adjourned until 8 o'clock, and promptly at that time the meeting was called to order. Then came the slow, tedious work of threshing out the numerous amendments to the constitution, which always cause hot discussions, and some of them this time were very warm, the chairmen having to ask for order on one or two occasions.

No Letters to Himself.
A great many of the amendments presented were carried. Henceforth the president cannot appoint himself referee.

Out the content of both competing clubs, in future in any championship matches, where home-and-home games are arranged, the home club must pay the traveling and local expenses of the visitors. If any club does not carry out the agreement, it shall forfeit its membership till the debt is paid.

On motion of Messrs. Thompson and Bailey, it was adopted that the order of business at the annual meeting, in future, shall be as follows: President's address; reading of secretary and treasurer's report; Credentials Committee's report; election of officers; election of new clubs; consideration of amendments to constitution and rules; general business.

In the form of certificates, the words, "and is a bona-fide resident of, or within a radius of five miles of, the place named," shall be struck out. The goal net plan was adopted.

The home club in all matches shall be responsible for keeping the grounds clear of spectators.

If either club demand it, the referee shall order the game to commence promptly at the advertised time, and shall put the ball in play, if only one team is on the field.

R. R. Keen, H. O'Longhin, Allan and J. Craig were appointed auditors for 1898. Hon. J. S. A. Macdonald and H. McConally were chosen as a committee to arrange as to details of the goal net.

The Two Associations.
The amendment that caused the hottest arguments was that made by D. A. Rose, and was not, it being that the C.I.A. deal with its own expelled members, without reference to the A.A.A. of C. It was shown by several of the retiring officers that the Association had recommended the reinstatement of Glover, and that they had been ignored by the A.A.A. Finally, it was recommended to the new council to enter into negotiations with the A.A.A. of C. to endeavor to place the relations on a better footing.

Seaforth, Athletics of St. Catharines, Aurora of Toronto, Elms and Neumesh declared their intention of entering the season of 1898. The year was chosen as the place for the next annual meeting, although Mr. Keen of Orillia, it was suggested, that the intermediate series be brought to the C.I.A. to be decided by a match, and be played with the champions of Quebec.
