Oliver Iselin at New Rochelle. As the successful cup defender passed up thru the harbor and East River she was gaily dressed with many yachting ensigns and signal flags and was saluted by nearly every steam craft she passed. Later it is expected the Reliance will be taken to City Island, to be hauled up for the winter.
