

## TERMS OF THE PEACE TREATY

Concluded Between Spain the United States,

In Which the Dons Give Up Their Island Provinces to Uncle Sam.

TERMS OF THE PEACE TREATY London, Dec. 14.-The Paris correspondent of the Times gives the following as the text of the Hispano-American treaty, omitting diplomatic cir-

cumlocution: Spain relinquishes all claims of sovereignty over and title to Cuba, and as the island is, upon its evacuation by Spain, to be occupied by the United States, the latter will, so long as such occupation shall last, assume and discharge the obligations in respect to protection of life and property, which may, under international law, result from its occupation.

Spain cedes to the United States the Island of Porto Rico and the other islands now under Spanish sovereignty in the West Indies, with Guam in the Maranno or Ladrone Islands.

Spain cedes to the United States the archipelago known as the Philippine

admit Spanish ships and merchandise to the ports of the Philippine Islands on the same terms as the ships and merchandise of the United States. The United States will, upon the signature of the present treaty, send back to Spain at its cost, the Spanish sol-

diers taken as prisoners of war on the capture of Manila. The arms of the soldiers in question shall be restored to them. Spain will, upon the signature of the present treaty, release all prisoners of war and all persons detained or imprisoned for political offenses in connection with the insurrection in Cuba

and the Philippines, and the war with the United States.
On their part, the United States will release all persons made prisoners of war by the American forces, and will undertake to obtain the release of all Spanish prisoners in the kands of the insurgents in Cuba and the Philip-

The United States will at their own cost return to Spain and the Government of Spain will at its own cost return to the United States, Cuba, Porto Rico or the Philippines, the prisoners released or caused to be released by them, respectively, under this provi-

The United States and Spain mutually relinquish all claims for indemnity, national and individual, of every kind, of either government, or of its citizens or subjects, against the other government that may have arisen since the beginning of the late insurrection in Cuba, and prior to the exchange of ratifications of the treaty, including all claims for indemnity for the cost of the war.

The United States will adjudicate and settle the claims of its citizens against Spain, relinquished under this

stipulation. Spanish subjects, natives of the peninsula, residing in the territory over which Spain by the present treaty re-linguishes or cedes her sovereignty, may remain in such territory, or may remove therefrom, retaining in either event all their rights of property, and they shall also have the right to carry on their industry, commerce and profession. In the event of their remaining in the territory, they may preserve their allegiance to the crown of Spain by making legal record, within a year from the date of the exchange of ratifications of the treaty, a declaration of their decision to preserve such allegiance, in default of which declaration they shall be held to have renounced it, and to have adopted the nationality of the territory in which

they reside. The civil rights and political status of the native inhabitants of the territory ceded to the United States shall be determined by congress. The inhabitants of the territory over which Spain relinquishes or cedes her sovereignty shall be secured in the free exercise of their religion.

The Spaniards residing in the territories over which Spain by this treaty cedes or relinquishes her sovereignty shall be subject in matters civil, as as criminal, to the jurisdiction of the courts of the country in which they reside.

The right of property secured by copyrights and patents acquired by the Spaniards in the Island of Cuba, and in Porto Rico, and the Philippines, and the other ceded territories at the time of the exchange of the ratifications of the treaty, shall continue to be respected. Spanish scientific, literary and artistic works not subversive of public order in the territories in question, shall continue to be admitted free of duty in such territories for a period of ter years, to be reckoned from the date of the exchange of the ratifications of the treaty.
Spain shall have the right to estab-

lish consular offices in the ports and other places of the territories, sove-reignty over which has either been relinguished or ceded by the present

The government of each country will, for a term of ten years, from the exchange of ratifications, accord to the merchant vessels of the other country the same treatment in respect to all plort charges, including entrance and clearance dues. light dues and tonnage duties, as it accords to its own merchant vessels not engaged in coastwise trade. This provision may at any time be determined, on six months' notice given by either government to

the other. It is understood that any obligation assumed in this treaty by the United States, with respect to Cuba, is limited to the time of the occupation by the United States of that island; but the United States Government will, upon the termination of such occupation, advise any government established in the island to assume the same obliga-

Of the British Liberal Party Leadership.

Summary of His Letter to Mr. Morley.

Mr. Morley's Reply-Sketch of the Noted Statesman's Busy Career.

HARCOURT'S RESIGNATION.

London, Dec. 14.-Right Hon. Sir William Vernon Harcourt, M. P. for West Monmouthshire, and since the resignation of the late Mr. Gladstone, the official leader of the Liberal party in the House of Commons, has addressed a letter to Mr. John Morley, Liberal leader for Montrose Borough, announcing his resignation of the leadership. He says:

The Liberal party, rent by sectional disputes and personal interests, is one which no man can consent to lead, either with credit to himself, or with advantage to the country." Mr. Morley, Spain cedes to the United States the archipelago known as the Philippine Sir William Vernon Harcourt, and says he is not surprised at the latter's decision. ship of the Liberal party, says:

HIS MIND MADE UP. "It seems to be supposed that this question ought to concern me, but I feel no anxiety in the matter. My record is clear and my resolution is fixed to undertake no responsibility and to occepy no position, the duties of which is made impossible for me to fulfill." He then proceeds to point out the 'labors and sacrifices leadership entail," remarking that they are "such as no man of a sense of honor will undergo except from high sentiment and public duty." He explains that he retained the leadership, after Mr. Gladstone's retirement, from a sense of duty "to face the heavy budget deficit caused by navar expenditures." After sketching a history of the Liberal party since that time, he says:

"UNWORTHY INSINUATIONS." "You and my other colleagues are well aware of the efforts I have made for unity. It has been whispered that I have allowed personal considerations to influence my public actions. man knows better than yourself the falsehood of these unworthy insinuations. I shall never consent to be a candidate for any contested position. I shall be no party to such degradation of the tone of public life. If I have arrived at the conclusion that I best discharge my duty toward can the party in an independent position in parliament, you will, I am sure, agree that a disputed leadership, beset by distracted sections and conflicting interests, is an impossible situation and that release from vain and onerous obligations will come to me as a welcome relief."

MR. MORLEY'S REPLY. Mr. Morley's reply is a very long and sympathetic justification of Harcourt's action, and a eulogy of his financial work, public spirit and zeal for the welfare of his party. It is understood that Harcourt will retain his seat in

the House of Commons.

HARCOURT'S SUCCESSOR. Lord Rosebery will evidently be indicated as the leader of the entire Liberal party. His brilliant speech on the Fashoda incident has settled that. As for the Liberal leadership in the House of Commons, everything points to Mr. Herbert Henry Asquith, member for East Fife, and secretary for the home department in the Gladstone-Rosebery Government, which began with Mr. Gladstone's premiership in 1892, and ended under Lord Rosebery's in 1895. A final decision as to future leaders will be taken at a meeting of the Liberal members prior to the reassembling of parliament. The Liberal papers have nothing to say, except to advise the party carefully to weigh all the circumstances before coming to a de-

### cision. CAUSED A SENSATION.

The letter to Mr. Morley, which was likely intended to forestall discussion of the leadership question at next Fri-day's conference at Birmingham, has produced a great sensation. The discussion turns upon the exact purpose of Harcourt as to whether the latter means an absolute resignation or as an ultimatum to the Liberal party to decide finally upon the rival claims. The letter is very carefully worded, and contains nothing that would prevent Harcourt's acceptance of the leadership if it were proffered with the united and unanimous support of the party. Mr. Morley's simple acquiescence points to the possibility that he may take the same course.

MR. HARCOURT'S CAREER.

Sir William Vernon Harcourt has for 25 years held a commanding position in the Liberal party. Mr. Gladstone long regarded him as his ablest ileu-tenant in the House of Commons. Second son of the Rev. Wm. Harcourt, and a grandson of a former Archbishop of York, he was born Oct. 14, 1827. In 1851 he left Cambridge University with high honors, and three years later he was called to the bar at the Inner Temple. In 1858 he unsuccessfully contested the Kirkcaldy Burghs, and ten years after was returned to the House of Commons for the Aty Oxford in the Liberal interests. was elected professor of int-rnational law in Cambridge University in 1869, and in 1873 was appointed solicitorgeneral, on which occar.on he was knighted. This office he held until the resignation of Mr. Gladstone's administration in February, 1874.

When Mr. Gladstone, returned to power in 1880, Sir William Harcourt was nominated secretary of state for the home department.
